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Local Youth Fined for Careless Driving

A Georgetown youth who took a corner on two wheels pleaded guilty in magistrate's court Wednesday to a charge of careless driving, and was fined \$80.50 including costs.

The youth speaks French only and had evidence interpreted to him by Acting Crown Attorney Douglas V. Latimer read statements of two witnesses.

The car turned the corner at Delrex Blvd. and Prince Charles on two wheels, said the statement of a woman resident of Delrex Blvd. She said it came speeding back a few minutes later, went up on the sidewalk sweeping from side to side.

She watched the youth's car from the window of her home.

A second witness, a Mackenzie Drive man, stated the accused was driving on his street in a careless manner the same day, June 23rd.

He notified police saying if the driving was allowed to continue "somebody is going to get hurt."
