The Red Sox scored 5 runs in the first inning, and one in each of the second and third to grab an early 7-0 lead. Giants roared from behind but darkness cut off their rally. Merv Fletcher started on the mound for the Red Sox and lasted four innings. He was lifted for Ron Naylor. Fletcher struck out two batters in the innings that he pitched. Naylor was credited with five in his stretch. Bernie Dore, though charged with the loss, went the route for the Giants allowing seven hits and striking out ten Sox.

The last cost Georgetown a great chance to move to within striking distance of the third place Oakville Oaks.
