Mayor Expresses Criticism Of Police Chief's Pay Raise

A proposed \$700 salary increase for Police Chief Roy Finley was criticized by Mayor Gibbons on Monday.

But a motion to set the chief's salary at an extra \$500 carried with no opposition from the mayor.

The mayor said he knows of no municipality other than Georgetown where the police chief is paid higher than the town clerk.

"I'm not saying anything I haven't said already. Law enforcement is one of the weakest spots in our municipal government," he said.

"We have to pay the salary the position warrants" said Reeve Elliott, "and the man has to fit it or something done about it."

"You know perfectly well I have nothing to do with police administration now" snapped the mayor, who named himself police chairman when committees were established this year. "I had nothing to do with preparing the budget you adopted. I'll be the first to congratulate the chief if we get the improvement we should have from this increase in numbers in the force."

After the motion, Reeve Elliott asked who is checking the police budget.

"I suppose you are, you're finance chairman" said the mayor. "Don't give people a false impression. Seldom have I presented a recommendation that council has adopted. I'm just an ordinary member of council when it comes to policing."

When the reeve insisted that someone must be responsible for checking the police budget, Cr. Don Powers said he would assume some share of responsibility as he had helped set the budget.

"Fine, and I'll do my best to look after water," said the mayor. (Cr. Powers is council's water chairman)
