the firm.

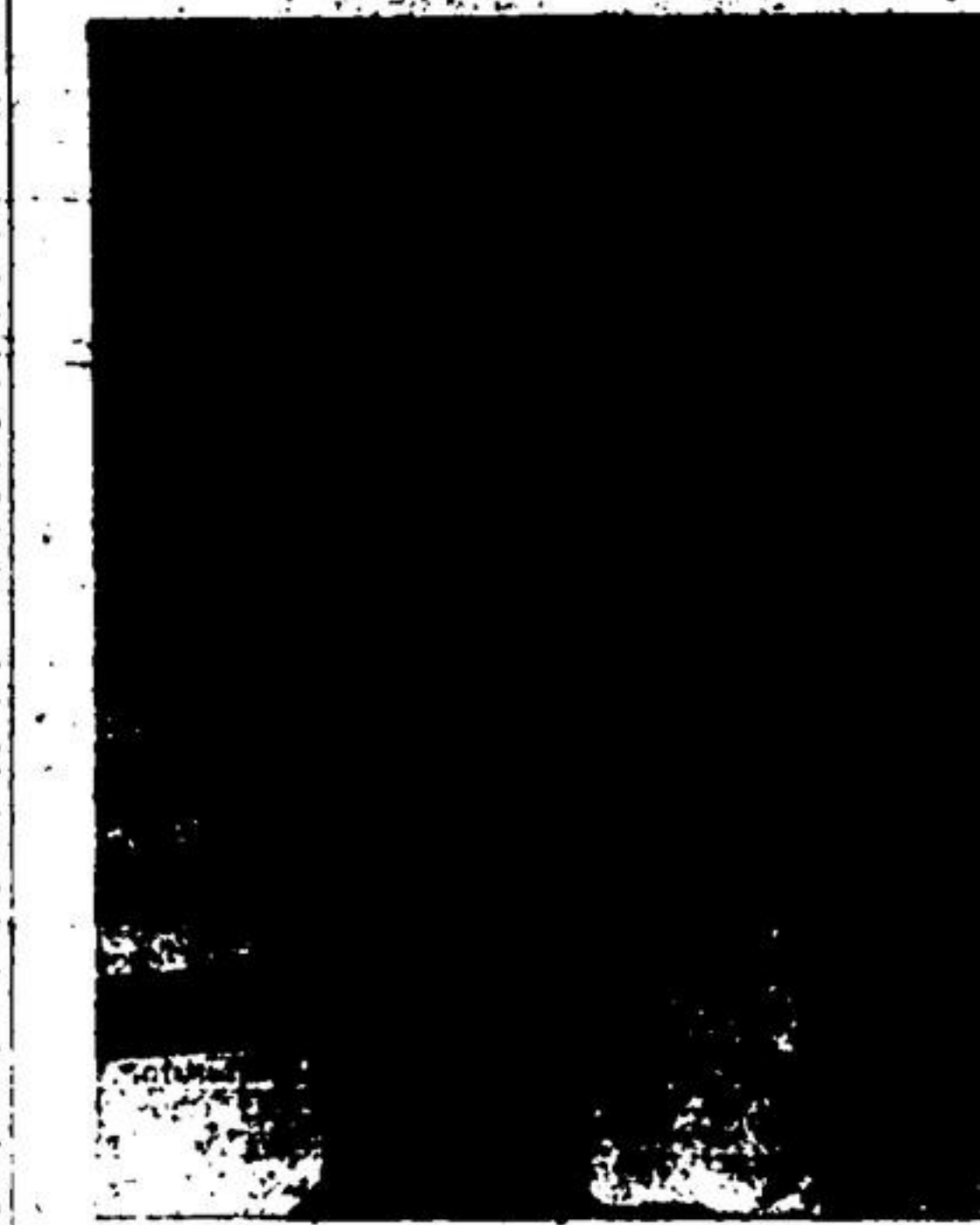
Mr. Douglas has been a Ge-
