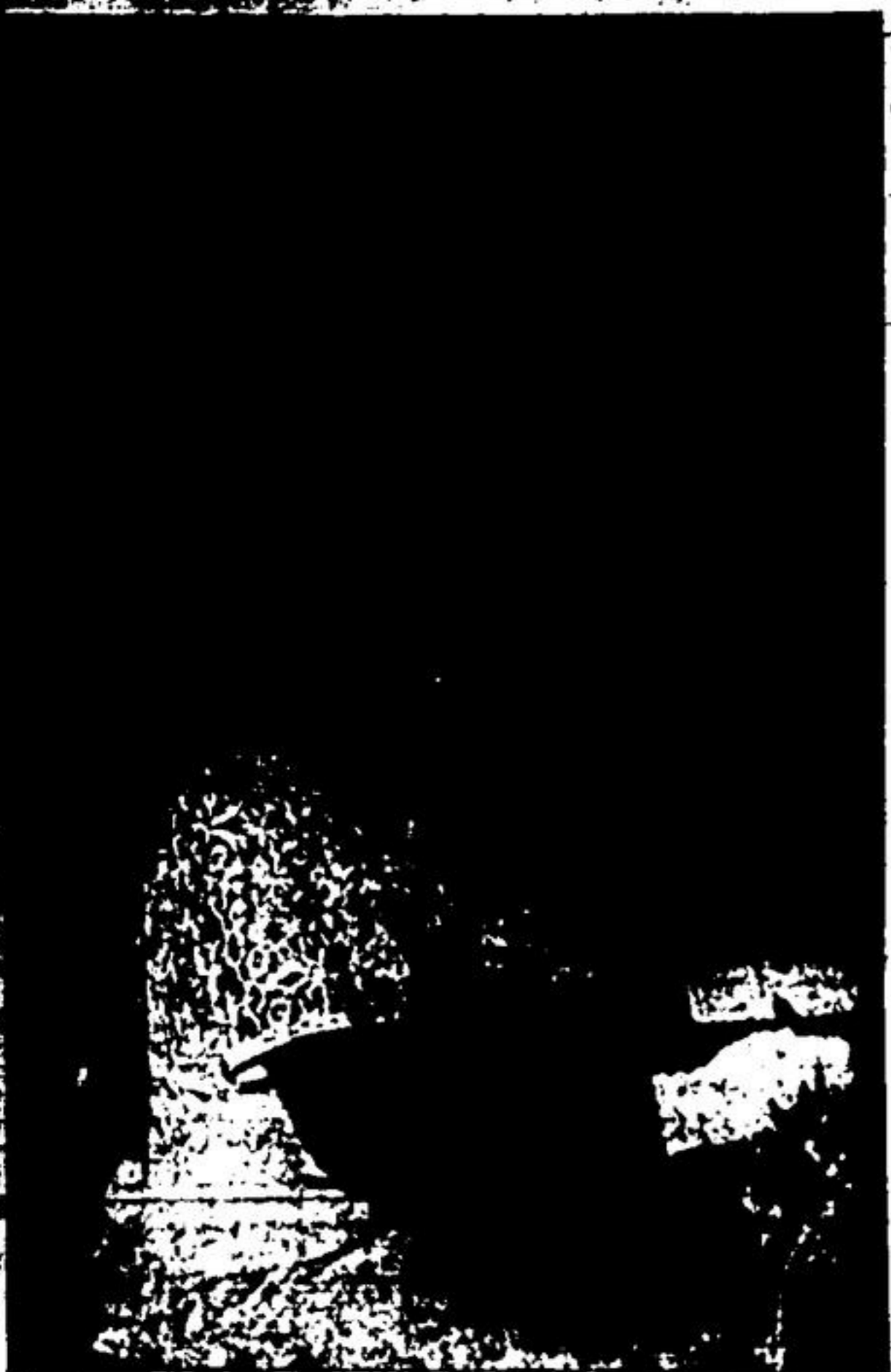


MARRIED IN ST. GEORGE'S

Soybean Experiments Are Viewed by Halton Farmers

Forty members of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association spent Wednesday morning on a tour of a number of experiments of their Association which were conducted in the county this year.

The first stop on the tour was at the farm of Hugh Healy, at Omagh. President of the association, Russell Hurren, welcomed the group and turned the meeting over to Bill Hurst, Soils and Crops Specialist and John Cockburn, Associate Agricultural Representative, who conducted the morning tour.

The group discussed the project whereby one-half of a field is to be drained, and all increase in production charged against the cost of installation, to determine if tile drainage will pay in this region of the county.

A field of Soybeans and a small plot of a new experimental type of bean called Pidgeon Bean was visited, with great interest. The association is trying to determine if there is a place for these beans, to be grown to replace the purchasing of protein supplement for our livestock.

The next stop on the tour was the Campbellville farm of Geo. and L. H. Leaver. Here again a field of Soybeans has been grown. Much interest was evident with regards to fertility and weed control practices for this crop. A very excellent field of direct seeded Alfalfa, and a general discussion of corn growing methods, highlighted this stop.

This is the first year that the Crop Improvement members have had their tour in the morning, and the added length of time available made for a more informal and educational type of meeting. Perhaps next year even more county farmers will take half a day and visit some of their Crop Improvement projects.

Avian Gyro is Cover Feature on Directory

"This little blue book is really interesting, where did it come from?" is the type of comment many a homemaker heard as her husband glanced through the Georgetown Directory with the picture of the Avian gyroscope on the cover.

It is the result of six months work by the Georgetown Jaycees. Not content with performing a service for the town, they also made money for their organization by selling enough advertising to more than cover the printing costs.

Not an extra penny was spent, with the Jaycees even delivering the booklet door to door, thus saving sixty dollars mailing costs. The Jaycees took only two nights each to cover the whole town.

The Junior Chamber themselves compiled all the information starting with Emergency telephone numbers. One seldom seen listed is the "Poison Control Centre" in Guelph and in Toronto. This number right in the front of the book could well save a life.

After a brief history of the founding of the town, the Council members and Committees are listed. Next all the municipal officials are given, including all appointed Boards and Commissions and School Boards both appointed and elected.

Churches appear next, fol-

lowed by service clubs, community and fraternal organizations. A professional Directory includes doctors, lawyers, engineers, accountants, chiropractors and optometrists.

Towards the end of the brochure is a list of major industries, and statistics about the town.

The information so compactly assembled herein could save many an hour of searching and phoning, and might even settle an argument or two.

In the middle of the little blue book is a map of the town, showing all the zoning and a legend explaining the references.
