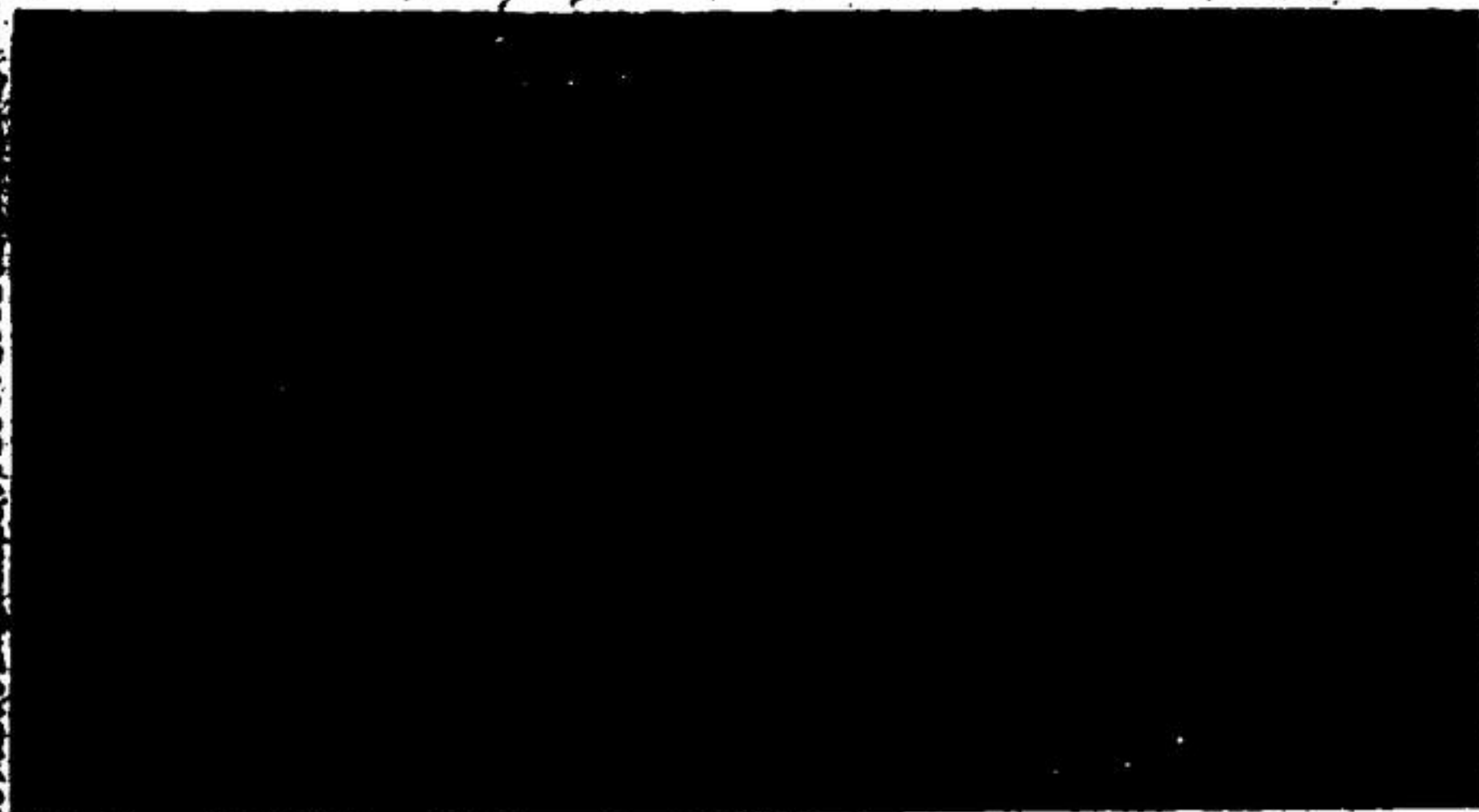


PRACTICE FOR EX

New Canadian Stamp in Honour Of Sir Winston

Details of a Canadian postage stamp to be issued August 12 to honour Sir Winston Churchill have been released by the Honourable Rene Tremblay, Postmaster General.

The stamp is the first Canadian stamp printed by the duotone offset process, a method of printing particularly suited to the reproduction of photographs. It features the famous "roaring lion" portrait of Sir Winston Churchill by Yousof Karsh, internationally renowned Canadian photographer. Complementary design is the work of Philip Weiss, Canadian Artist and Director of the Department of Industry's National Design Branch.

The stamp will be printed in brown by the Canadian Bank Note Company Limited of Ottawa. The total number of stamps printed is 35 million.

A half-year statement issued this week by Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Company shows a substantial increase in all departments of the firm.

This county company, established by O. E. Manning, who is still president, has met a ready acceptance in the county. From its original office in Oakville, it has grown to branches in Brampton, Burlington, Simcoe, Cookville, Milton and Delhi.
