"I wouldn't ordinarily protest the game, but this one meant so much to our kids that I couldn't see letting this one go," he told The Herald. At the time the Georgetown club led the league by one game.

The disputed decision came on a play on which Georgetown scored one run. Trailing 2-0 in the final frame, Georgetown batted the bases with Pat Davison, Jann McNally and Eve Seckington.

Two were out when Judy Sheppard, after fouling off five pitches sent a looping single to right field. Davison scored easily with the first run and Jann McNally appeared to be under the tag with the tying run, but the plate ump, a Hornby youth who travelled to the game with the team didn't see it that way.

Fang near the plate area said the Hornby catcher dropped the ball, and the infield umpire who was in front of the play agreed but was never consulted.

Kerr and Murcar shared the Hornby pitching, while Marilyn Eagles went the distance for the losers.

The loss and the way it came about cast a cloak of gloom over the Georgetown team's end of schedule party at the home of pitcher Marilyn Eagles after the game, at least until hot-dogs and refreshments were served and guitar playing livened up the affair.
