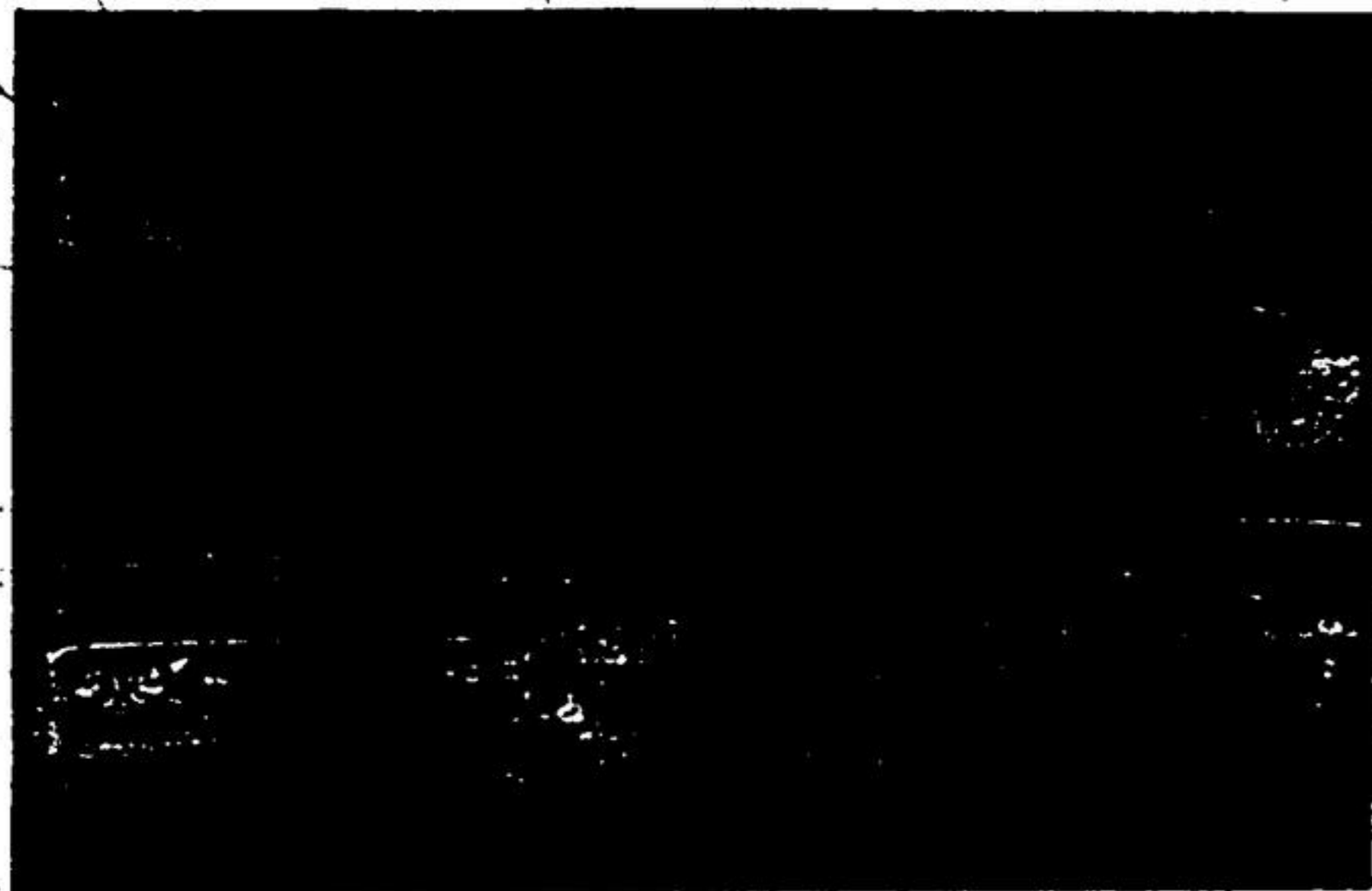

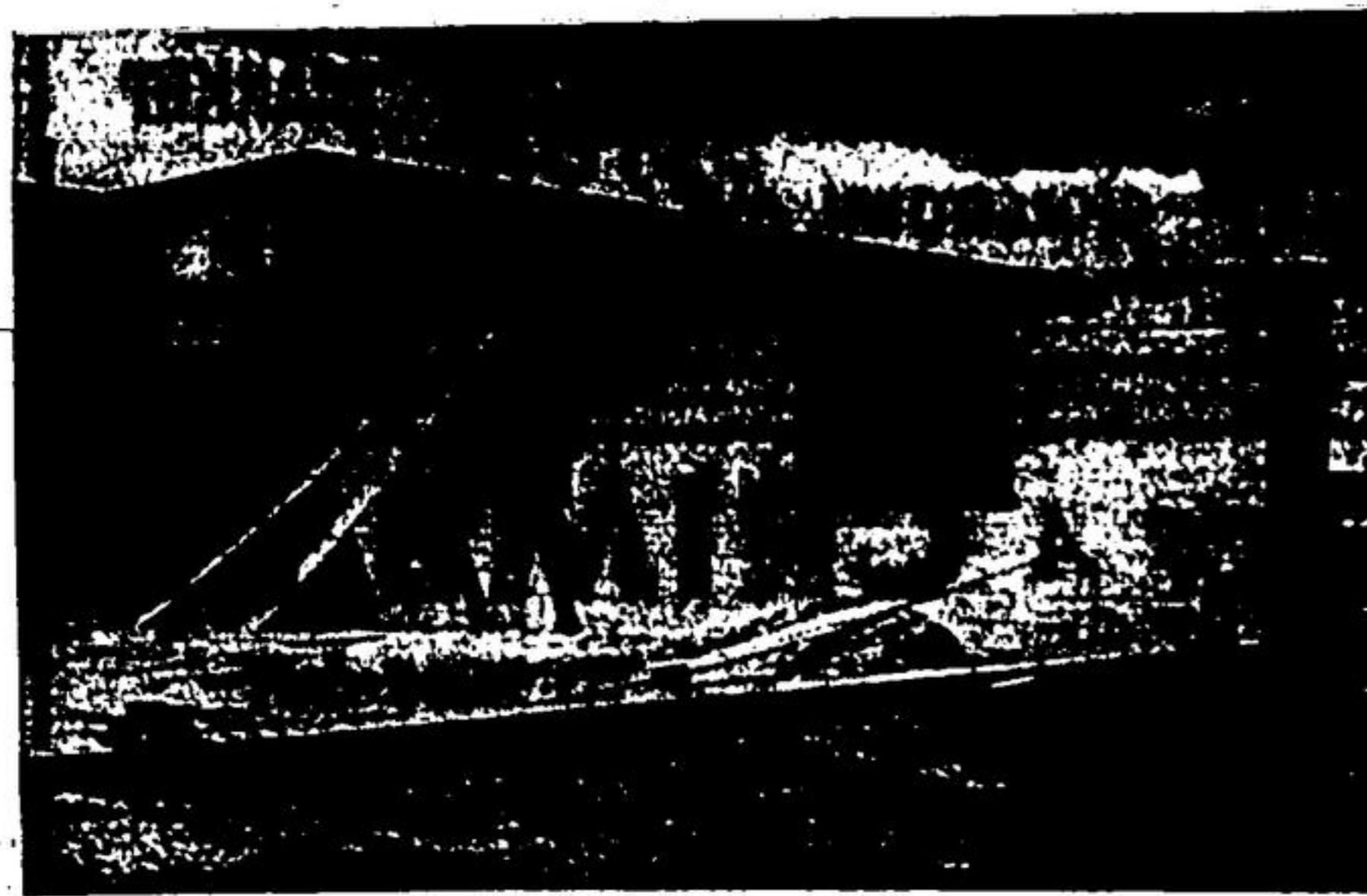
CAR DEALER, INDUSTRIES ADD ELBOW ROOM



THIS ADDITION TO PHILLIPS Chrysler-Dodge on Guelph St. E. expands space at the dealership by 1,640 sq. ft. The much needed room will be used for showroom and office space. The dealership, which has operated for three years became Phillips Chrysler-Dodge in December, 1964. The addition there is one of a number of construction projects in town this summer.



THIS CONSTRUCTION at Varian Associates on Mountainview Road at River Drive will provide new quarters for the firm's offices. Space presently occupied by the offices will be used for production. The newest addition expands the plant by 4,600 sq. ft.

Settled Near Georgetown Carr Family Has Reunion

Believed to be the first time since William Carr came from Scotland to settle in Georgetown vicinity in 1850 with the survivors of his plague stricken family, 86 of his descendants attended a reunion on the farm of Lloyd Wiltshire near Grand Valley Sunday August 1st.

A sudden brief thunder and hail storm failed to disburse the relatives, many of whom were getting to know one another for the first time.

Two of the eighth generation in Canada were introduced to the gathering. They were Deborah Suzanne and Sherri Lynn, infant daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Gill, 7542 Chinoak Drive, Malton, the sixth generation born in this country.

So successful was the outing which took the form of a family picnic, that it was voted to make it an annual event. Next year's reunion will be held at Carrwood, the West Flamboro home of Bruce W. Carr, who, along with Lloyd Wiltshire, Grand Valley, David H. Carr, London, and Mrs. James Porter, Keswick, were rejected as reunion committee with William Carr, of Long Branch, added.

Oldest person attending was Alex Lindsay, of Elora, while the youngest was Stephanie Helene Rambo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Rambo, 170 Atlas Ave., Toronto. Marie Oerline, of Scotland, Calif., came the greatest distance.

Minister of Glen Williams and several United churches a quarter century ago, Rev. Charles J. P. Jelliffe died Friday at his home at Rockwood, a few hours after his 88th birthday.

He was a veteran of 38 years missionary service in China. Born at Paisley, he left his parents' Rockwood farm at 19 and graduated from the University of Toronto in 1904. From 1906 to 1927 he was a United Church missionary in Szechwan province, China and was decorated by the Chinese government for Red Cross service in the civil war.

Before retiring in 1943, he served congregations at Glen Williams and Baites Blower, His mission.

He leaves his wife, Gertrude Biglow and five children, Edward, Mrs. Alison Somerville, Richard and Mrs. Frances Macdonald, all of Toronto and Paul of Malton, recently director of British Children's Aid Society. There are 13 grand-children.

Funeral services will be held on Monday afternoon at Rockwood United Church and interment was in Rockwood Cemetery.

Anniversary greetings to Mr. and Mrs. George Leslie, who will celebrate their wedding anniversary on August 13th.

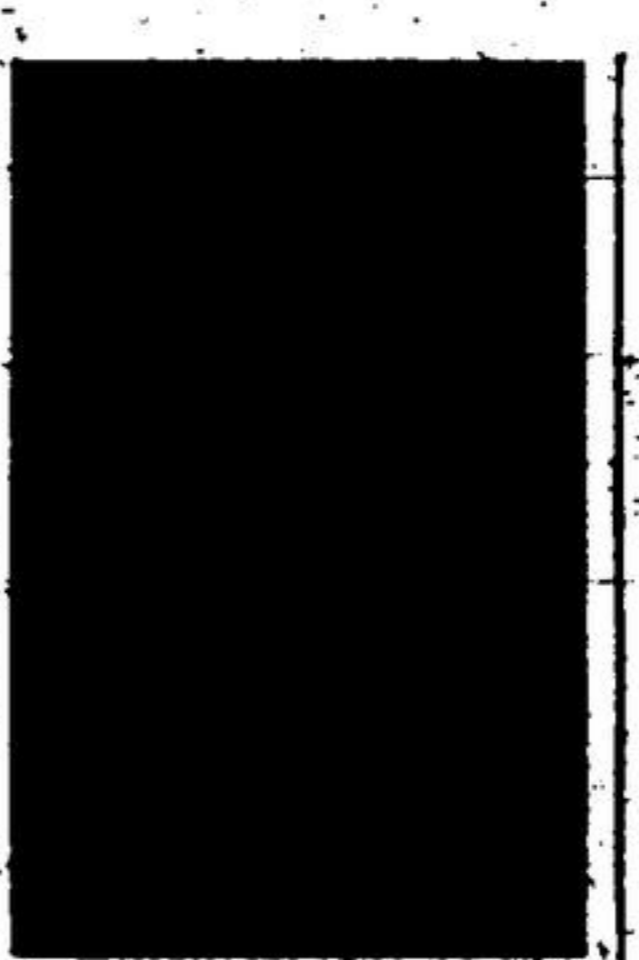

The heavy Civic Holiday rains caused drainage problems in many parts of Georgetown, and subsequent complaints to the town council.

One for which action was promised was at the James Costigan residence on Market Street. When a roadway was raised a few years ago, the Costigan front yard was put two feet below street level. And according to some councillors, an inadequate drain was installed under the road which frequently clogs.

Merve Elliott warned council that the road might have to be torn up and it could be a costly job. The town engineer has been asked to submit a cost estimate.

A demonstration of seed cleaning was given by the manager, Mr. Stuart Hall, who also provided buns and chocolate milk for the members.

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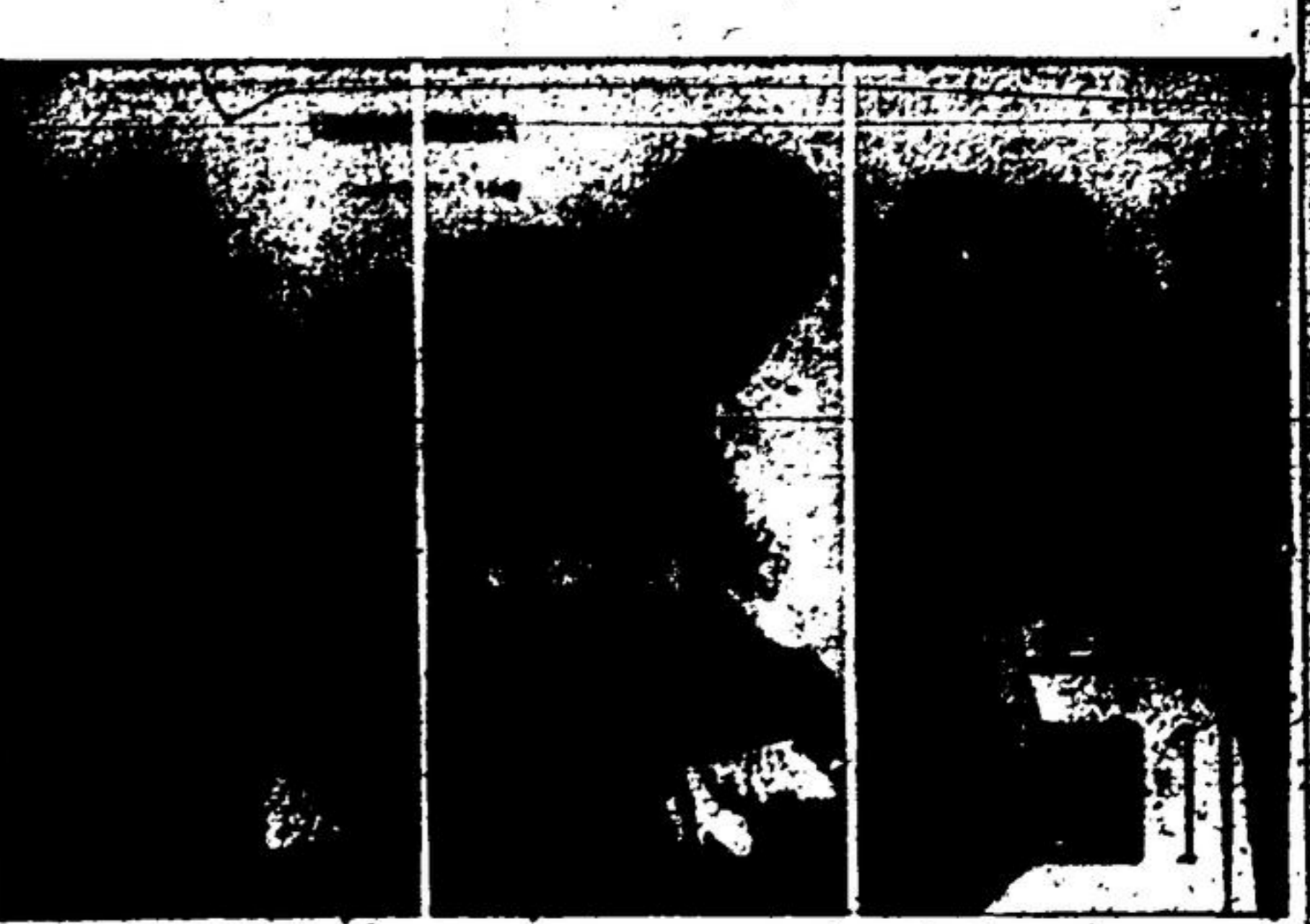
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
