

Coroner's Jury Recommends Inhalator, Brook Airway At All Swimming Pools

A coroner's jury Thursday night recommended a Brook Airway mouth to mouth breathing device, and a bag inhalator be available at every public swimming pool and personnel be trained in the use of it.

The recommendations were contained in the jury's report after a series of witnesses called in an inquest at Esquewaug Township Hall into the death of Grant Robert Portch who collapsed and died after a race in a pool at YMCA Camp Norval, August 5th.

The jury, foreman David Emmille, Fred Nurse, Thomas Dillon, Joseph Schertel, and Melvyn Stark, all of Esquewaug Township found the boy's death due to accidental drowning. They said everyone who had a hand in attempting to revive the unconscious Y counsellor after he had mysteriously blacked out at the end of the race acted in a capable manner and they attached no blame.

The jury retraced from the Esquewaug council chamber scene of inquest, at 10:15 and returned with the report of their findings at 11:05.

Crown Attorney Peter K. McWilliams who conducted most of the questioning suggested to the jury that they return a verdict that "nothing in the evidence indicates foul play or a lack of safety features or neglect. The main puzzle here," he said, "is how it happened that an excellent swimmer could drown."

The Crown called nine people to the stand to give information. Dennis Farmer, a Toronto West End Y camper, who raced with Portch in the Y pool just before he collapsed, and swim director Peter Harris who pulled his unconscious assistant from the water, Mrs. Mary Watson, the camp nurse, Dr. J. P. Martin, Dr. M. G. O'Dwyer, Charles Portch, the boy's father, Garth Holloway, another Y camp counsellor, Lorbergs Modak, the director of Camp Norval, and Dr. Waldorf, regional pathologist.

Area pathologist Dr. J. H. Chamberlain conducted the inquest.

Dr. Waldorf, last to be called, relayed the findings of Dr. Robert Hutson, the regional pathologist who handled the autopsy, but was unable to be present.

He said the deceased lungs contained "a considerable amount of congestion", and his vocal chords and larynx were swollen to such a degree that they were obstructive. These facts, he said, were the major findings.

He said the fatality was most likely due to "several acts of fate", the inhalation of a small amount of water, the spasms of the larynx, a blow on the back of the head when the boy collapsed at the end of the race, possibly swallowing more water after blacking out, and additional swelling of the vocal

chords during revival attempts. Being specific Dr. Waldorf commented, "I would say the cause of death would be respiratory failure presumably triggered by the swallowing of water."

Dennis Farmer, age 11, told the jury, "Grant talked me into racing him when at first I refused to do the butterfly stroke for the length of the pool because I was tired. He gave me a head start. At the end we both stood up, somebody said the race was a tie. Then Grant fell over on me and grabbed me. At first I thought he was kidding, but when I saw he wasn't I yelled for help. When we lifted him out he didn't talk or say anything."

"I saw him stand up at the end of the race, take a step and touch the end of the pool and then lean over and put his arms around Dennis," Harris testified. "He slid off and banged his head. Dennis grabbed him and yelled. When I got over to him Grant was gagging and moaning. Dennis and I lifted him onto a platform. I lifted mouth to mouth resuscitation when the nurse came into the pool area."

Mrs. Watson said, "A boy ran into my office and said Grant was having a seizure. When I got to him his pupils were dilated and he had no wrist pulse. Pete said he thought there was an obstruction so we cleared his stomach. After that Pete

said the mouth-to-mouth was easier." Mrs. Watson used external cardiac massage until two doctors arrived.

"When Dr. Panabaker and myself arrived the boy had no pulse, and no heart beat. His colour was greyish and his lips were slightly blue," Dr. J. P. Martin testified. The doctors took turns using external cardiac massage even during his transportation to hospital by GVAS.

Dr. Gerald O'Dwyer, who also took the stand, said the boy's chest was opened at the hospital so a massage could be applied directly to the heart. The doctors ceased their efforts after working two hours without success.

Dr. Waldorf explained the fatality was termed a drowning because it was triggered by the inhalation of water. "Prolonged exertion is not necessary for a death to be called a drowning," he commented.

The equipment recommended is comparatively new and inexpensive.

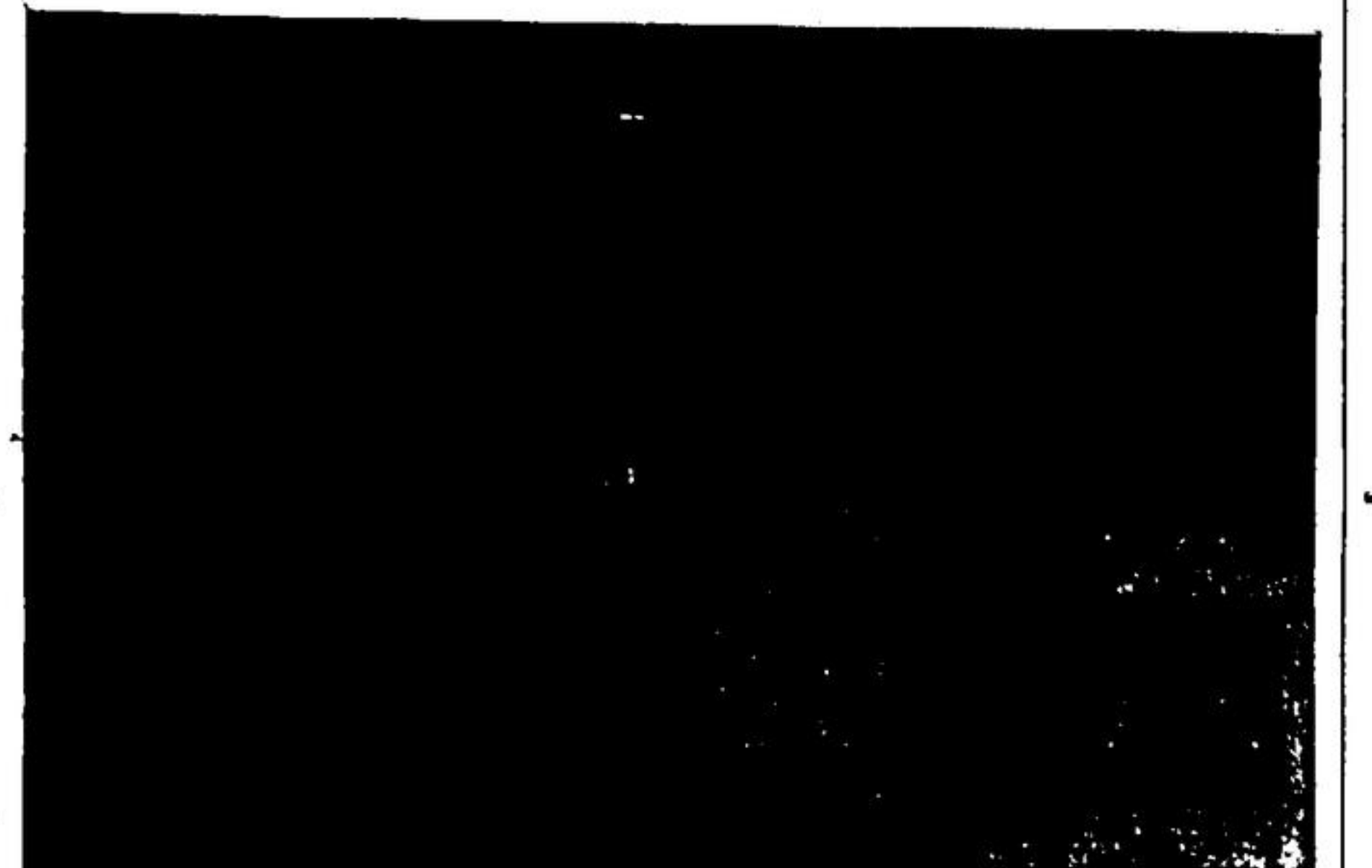
at festivals and scholarships. She has recently received honours on her Grade 9 vocal, and is also a silver medalist of the Royal Conservatory.

Tire Blows, Transport Has Wild Ride Into 401 Gulley

The driver escaped unharmed when a tractor trailer blew a tire and went wild on the McDonald-Cartier Freeway near Hornby, Thursday.

Deep tracks in the grass down the embankment clearly marked the route of the vehicle. It broke off a few guide posts before making the plunge.

The accident was investigated by the North Halton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.

Frank Naegelle, Toronto, was the man at the wheel when the heavy vehicle blew the tire, crossed the freeway median, crossed the westbound lanes, and then plunged down the side of the steep embankment built over a road and creek.

The tractor and its 45 ft. trailer succeeded in getting down the 50 foot embankment without an upset.

It then crossed the 8th Lane of Esquewaug and stopped in the creek actually forming a bridge over it.

The driver received only bruises to his knees while the \$30,000 tractor suffered only \$2,000 damage.

The windshield popped out when the truck hit the creek, the driver stated.

Police said the truck would have overturned going down the embankment had it been carrying a load.

Proposes Municipal Heads Meet With MPs, Commissioner
