

# Town Fillies First Wearers of Glen Ball Tournament Crown

A well organized and smooth operating women's softball tournament in the Glen Williams ball park Saturday established two points — the event will be an annual sports highlight — and the Georgetown girls ball club are now favourites to win the Malton County Ladies Softball urban division title.

The Georgetown club earned the favourite's mantle by emerging from the day-long Glen Williams slug-a-bout with all the marbles.

Georgetown bounced the hosting Glen women's team 10 to 4 in their first test, trampled Palermo 17 to 3 in the semi final, and convincingly disposed

of Oakville 13 to 7 in the grand championship match under the new Glen park floodlights.

Oakville gained the finalist position by doubling up Hornby 6 to 3, and then scoring a last inning run to shade Milton 3 to 1 in the semi.

Georgetown's formula was a

combination of good hitting and good pitching. Gloria Zilio held the Glen team to just 3 hits while her mates rapped 13 hits off Glen hurlers Brooks and Lyons.

The semi-final was much the same story statistically with Marilyn Eagles hand-cuffing the Palermo women on just 4 hits while Georgetown cranked 19. The hits were even in the championship match, 13 apiece.

The journey was favoured with good weather which boosted the crowd to a size that gratified the organizing committee headed by Blake Inglis. Although an estimate of the total attendance could be

made because of fans arriving and departing for lunch or supper, spectators at the home stretch games in particular were fortunate if they could find a choice vantage point.

Baking and refreshments were available on the grounds with all proceeds of the day earmarked for the flood lighting fund.

## Giants Top Milton in Round Robin Playoffs

Play-off baseball is completely different from the brand of baseball that is played in the regular season.

This was proved last Wednesday when Georgetown Giants defeated Milton Red Sox 3-1 in the round-robin play off between the bottom three teams in the league.

Georgetown finished fifth in the seven team Halton County Baseball League and Milton was in sixth place.

Both teams played flawless ball in the field and received good pitching.

Georgetown starter Jim Lindsay pitched the complete seven innings and allowed just five hits, struck out three and walked just one man.

Merv Fletcher, who pitched the complete game for the Red Sox, allowed only three hits, struck out six and didn't walk a batter in taking the loss.

The longest hit of the ballgame came off the bat of Milton second baseman Pete Sberatt who had a double in the second inning. All the other hits were singles.

A call that was bitterly protested by Milton manager Dick Clement had a large part in the outcome of the ball game.

In the fifth inning Lindsay hit a high fly ball that was out of bounds near the Milton bench. Milton first baseman Bill Currie caught the ball but the umpire ruled that the ball was out of play and Lindsay stayed alive at the plate.

If he had been called out the inning would have been over and Georgetown would not have scored their winning run.

George Doucette had singled and stole second base and then Lindsay, after he was allowed to stay at the plate, singled watch the four top contenders battle for the title.
