The All-Stars left 15 runners stranded on base and two had the bases loaded and failed to score.

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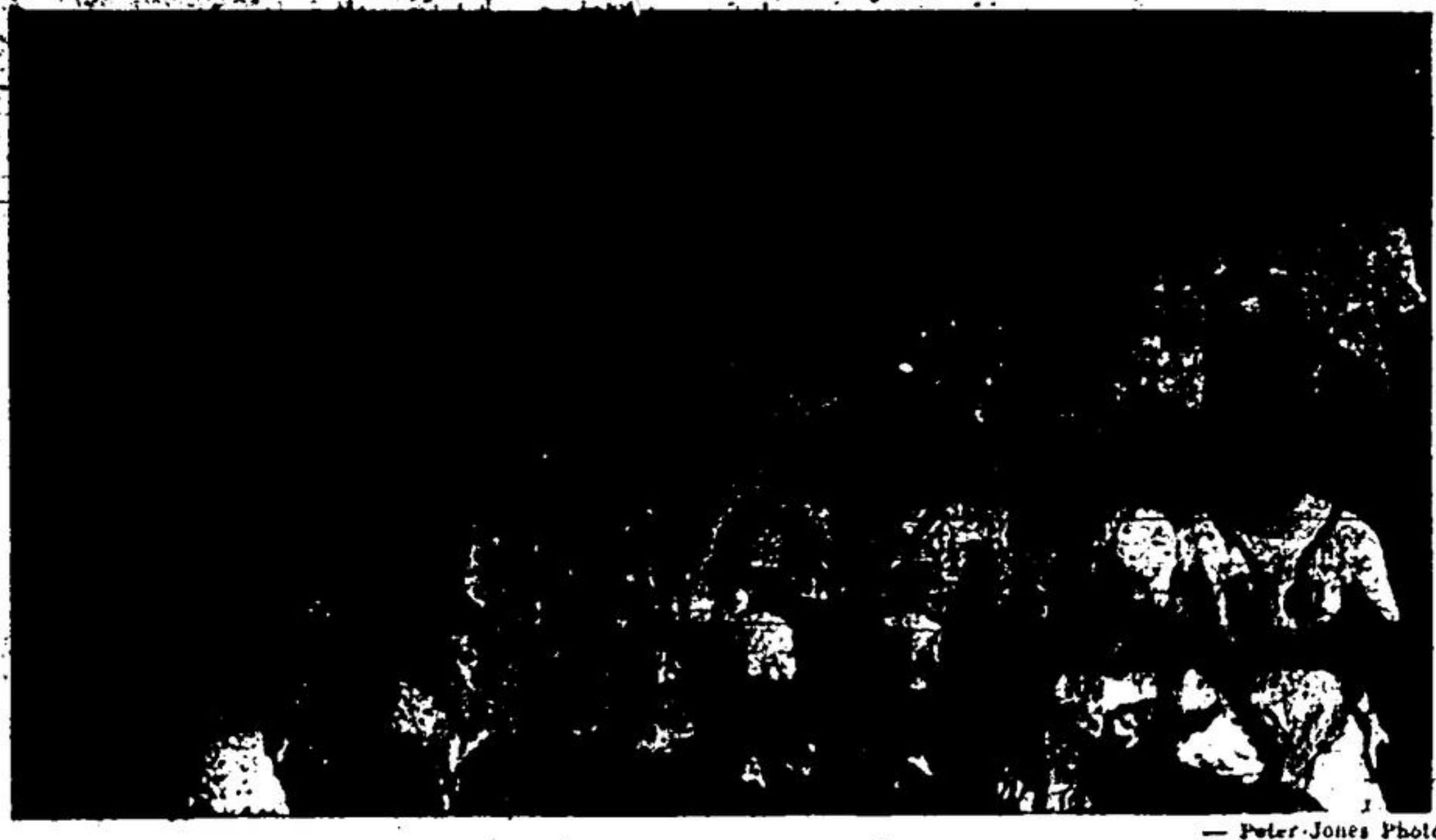
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BEAUMONT SHIELD WINNERS

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Raider, NHL Oldtimers Will Meet In Hockey School Feature

A game between the National Hockey League Oldtimers and the Georgetown Raider Old-timers will be a feature at a special meeting in discussion of a week long hockey school in October.

A member of the special hockey school committee set up by the sponsoring Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group, Red Asseltine said this week that the exhibition game will be held Sunday October 17 in the middle of the two weeks of hockey instruction at the arena.

A form letter and application form with information on the hockey school has just been printed by the GMHSNG and will be in the schools and the arena at the commencement of the fall term.

The hockey school will start on October 12 and run through to October 22 with the exception of Sundays giving a total of ten days of instruction periods. The ten days will be divided into two 5 day courses.

Fees for the school will be \$6 per student per course. The minimum age limit is eight years of age and the maximum 18 years as of June 1, 1965.

Registration dates are September 11, from 9 a.m. until 12 noon and September 18, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Birth certificates or proof of age must be submitted at time of registration.

"After many years as a support group sponsoring All Star Minor Hockey in Georgetown, one group (GMHSNG) has held many meetings in discussion of how they can better hockey for boys of Georgetown," the letter states. "Our calibre of coaching has reached a peak, and the proof of this is in the performance of our Midget Club, who in the past three years have gained the All Ontario A Minor championship, as well as other tourney events. Georgetown Pee Wees at last came through this past season also with an Ontario championship plus the Goderich Tournament Trophy."

One paragraph explains the reason for arranging the school. "Usually our seasons commence long after most others and we feel that the organizing of this school will help to condition physically all boys interested."

The letter says special skating instruction from a qualified instructor and specialists in hockey coaching will be the main feature of the school. It is also hoped that instructional films will be shown.

The support group has booked the arena ice for the two weeks solid and hope to augment their funds with returns from the Oldtimers game, and renting the ice when it is not being used by the students.
