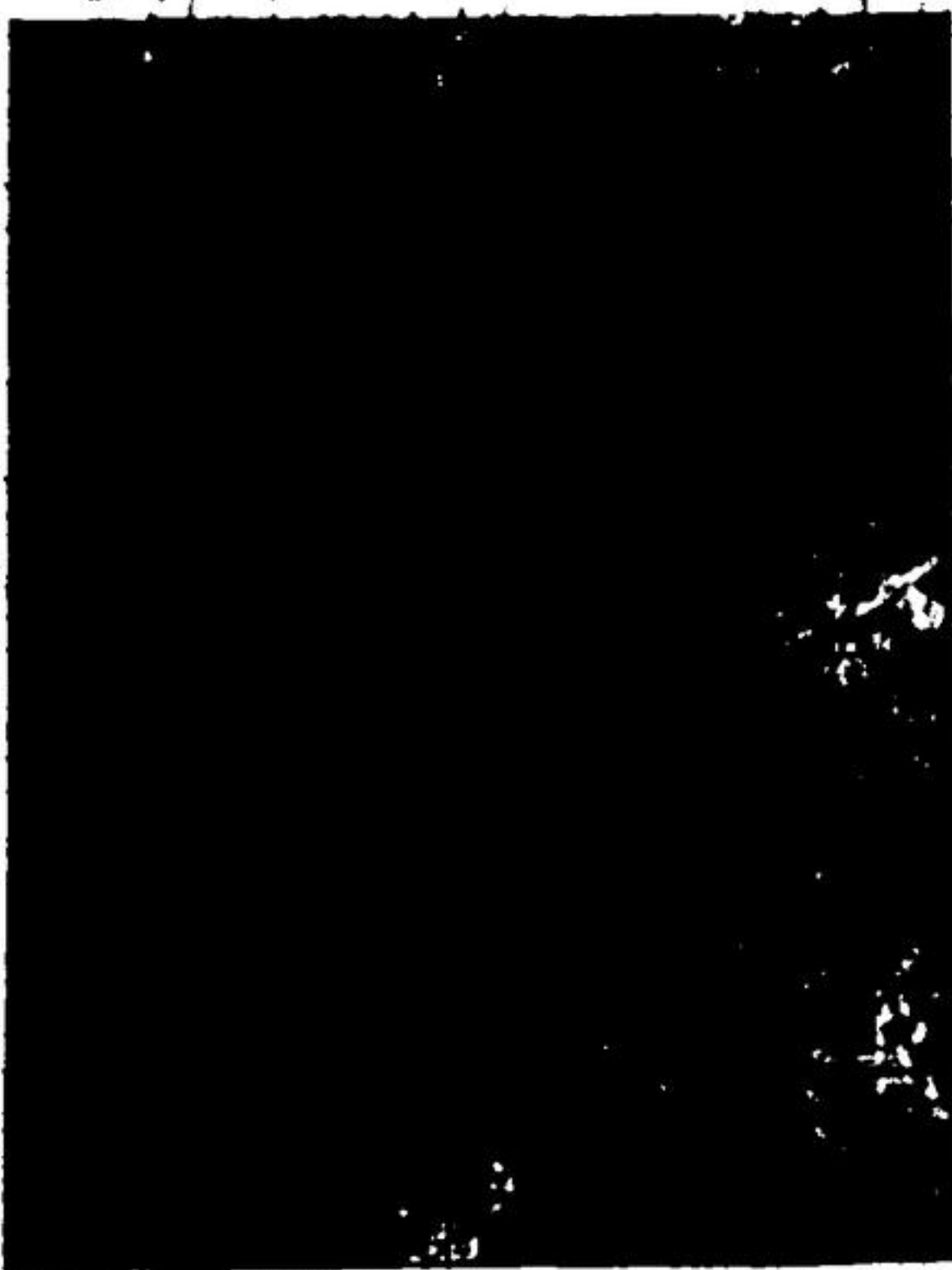


Loyalty's Fine, But Let's Not Get Ridiculous

Two Hospitalized After Hotel, Park Lot Assaults

Four have been charged in connection with a double assault at the McGibbon Hotel and parking lot late Tuesday night August 10.

The four were picked up by Georgetown police shortly after a McGibbon Hotel waiter, Andy Thompson, 10 Queen St. and another man, William Hillier Jr., 8 Dufferin Street were beaten up.

The four appeared in court last week and were released on bail.

Hillier was released from Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital yesterday. He was treated for his injuries by Dr. J. P. Martin and Dr. M. G. O'Dwyer. Surgery was performed on Hillier's fractured jaw.

Thompson is still in hospital. He was tended to by Dr. O'Dwyer.

Police said the attacks took place shortly before 10:30 Tuesday.

Thompson was beaten and his jaw broken when he attempted to eject some of a group from the hotel beverage room. Hillier who came to Thompson's aid was jumped ten minutes later in the public parking lot.

Deputy Police Chief Robert Wilson said police are still investigating the attacks.

Barber and Black ranked among the top cadets on the course, and Francis was one of the most proficient driver-mechanics students.

Cadets at Petawawa were offered three advanced courses.

Also just home is Georgetown high school cadet Richard Ildredston who has best training with the best cadets from all across Canada at the Master Cadet Camp, Banff, Alberta.

He received training in mountain climbing among other advanced subjects. He was named the GDHS Corps' Best Cadet at the annual inspection at Georgetown last May.

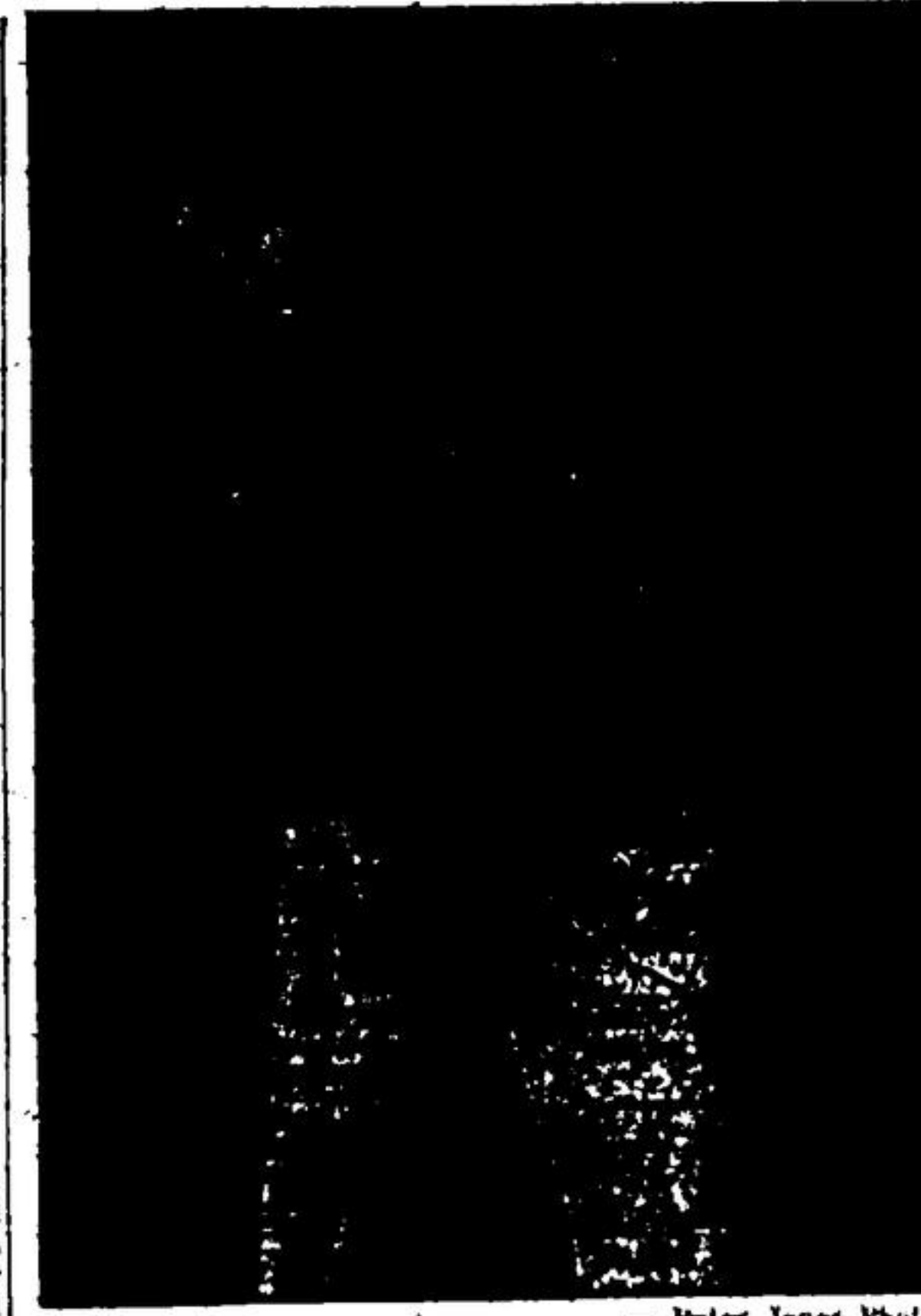
