Industry Seeking 12 Delrex Acres

Deputy - Reeve Tells Council of Prospect at Tuesday Night Session

A substantial industry is on the verge of locating in Georgetown. Deputy Reeve Wm. F. Hunter revealed the news to a council committee meeting Tuesday. The industry, he said, would purchase for \$1000 an acre twelve of the 175 acres which the town is proposing to buy from Delrex Developments at \$100 an acre.

But Georgetown will have to move fast, he said. And he hoped that it might be possible that right to call a special council meeting to make a final decision on the land purchase.

No such action was taken, but a by-law will be presented next Monday for council's decision. The committee meeting had been called to discuss the question of releasing all the Delrex lands for building, under a new agreement which would replace one made in 1954 by which a ratio clause has stalled further development.
