


A lifelong district resident, Mrs. Herbert Cleave, 81 of 19 Durham St. died in Georgetown hospital August 15.

The former Josephine Bell Anthony, she was the daughter of Andrew Kyle Anthony and Elizabeth Cunningham and was born on their Faquesing Township farm. She attended Pinegrove school and was a member of Norval Presbyterian Church in her youth.

Following their marriage in 1911, Mr. & Mrs. Cleave farmed on the present Ernest Curry farm in the Scotch Block, until they retired and moved to Georgetown in 1943. She was a memher of Esquesing Women's Institute and later Georgetown W. I. As a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, she was a charter member of the Scotch Block group of the W.
