A lifelong district resident, Mrs. Herbert Cleave, 81 of 19 Durham St. died in Georgetown hospital August 15.

The former Josephine Bell Anthony, she was the daughter of Andrew Kyle Anthony and Elizabeth Cunningham and was born on their Esquesing Township farm. She attended Pinegrove school and was a member of Norval Presbyterian Church in her youth.

Following their marriage in 1911, Mr. & Mrs. Cleave farmed on the present Ernest Curry farm in the Scotch Block, until they retired and moved to Georgetown in 1945. She was a member of Esquesing Women's Institute and later Georgetown W. I. As a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, she was a charter member of the Scotch Block group of the W. A. and later the Royal Circle and belonged to the Women's Missionary Society.

She took an active interest with her husband in the Esquesing Agricultural Society and was an honorary director of the society.

She leaves her husband, one daughter Dorothy, Mrs. J. E. Hartley of Burlington, three grandchildren Carolyn, David and Dean Hartley, and two sisters, Mrs. Harold Bingham (Gertrude) and Mrs. W. C.
