The Belect Committee appointed by the Lagislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario ". . . to Inquire Into and ferliew the provisions of The Conservation Authorities Act and such other Acts of this Lagislature televent to the powers exercised by conservation authorities as the Committee may deem appropriate

"And that without limiting the generality of the foregoing to inquire into and review the following matters:

(a) the constitution and powers of conservation authorities Including the number and method of appointment of mombers;

(b) the system of financing the work of conservation suthorities and the ability of local municipalities to pay for their share of conservation schemes:

(c) the power of conservation authorities to acquire or expropriate lands and the methods used therefor; (d) the administrative practices and methods of conservation authorities in carrying out their responsibilities

under The Conservation Authorities Act." Conservation authorities, municipalities, associations and Individuals are invited to present submissions.

Submissions should be filed with the Secretary by October 15th, 1965. Hearings will commence subsequent to that data.


