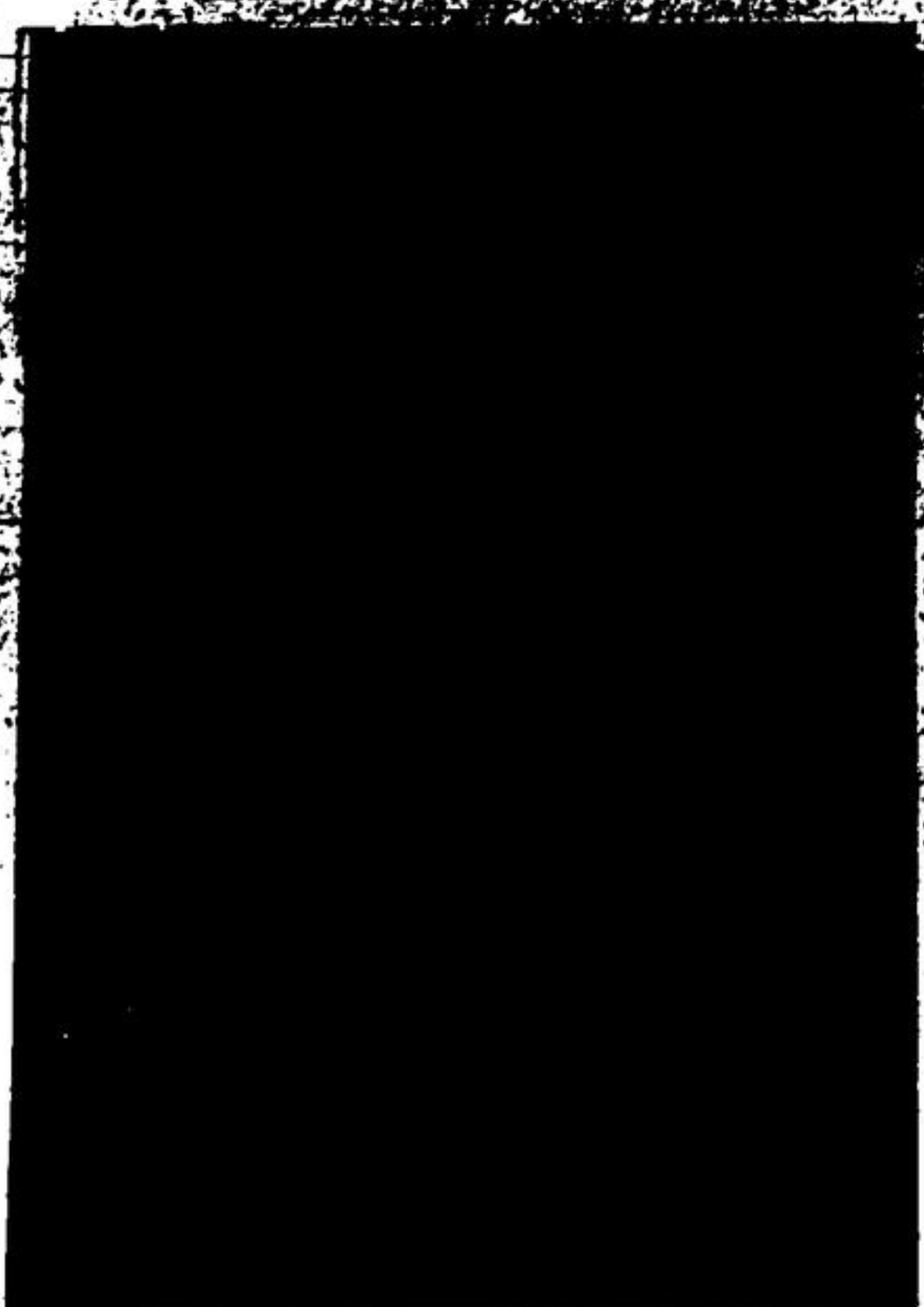

MR. AND MRS. BRUCE EYRE (Pamela Turnbull), married in St. George's Anglican Church.



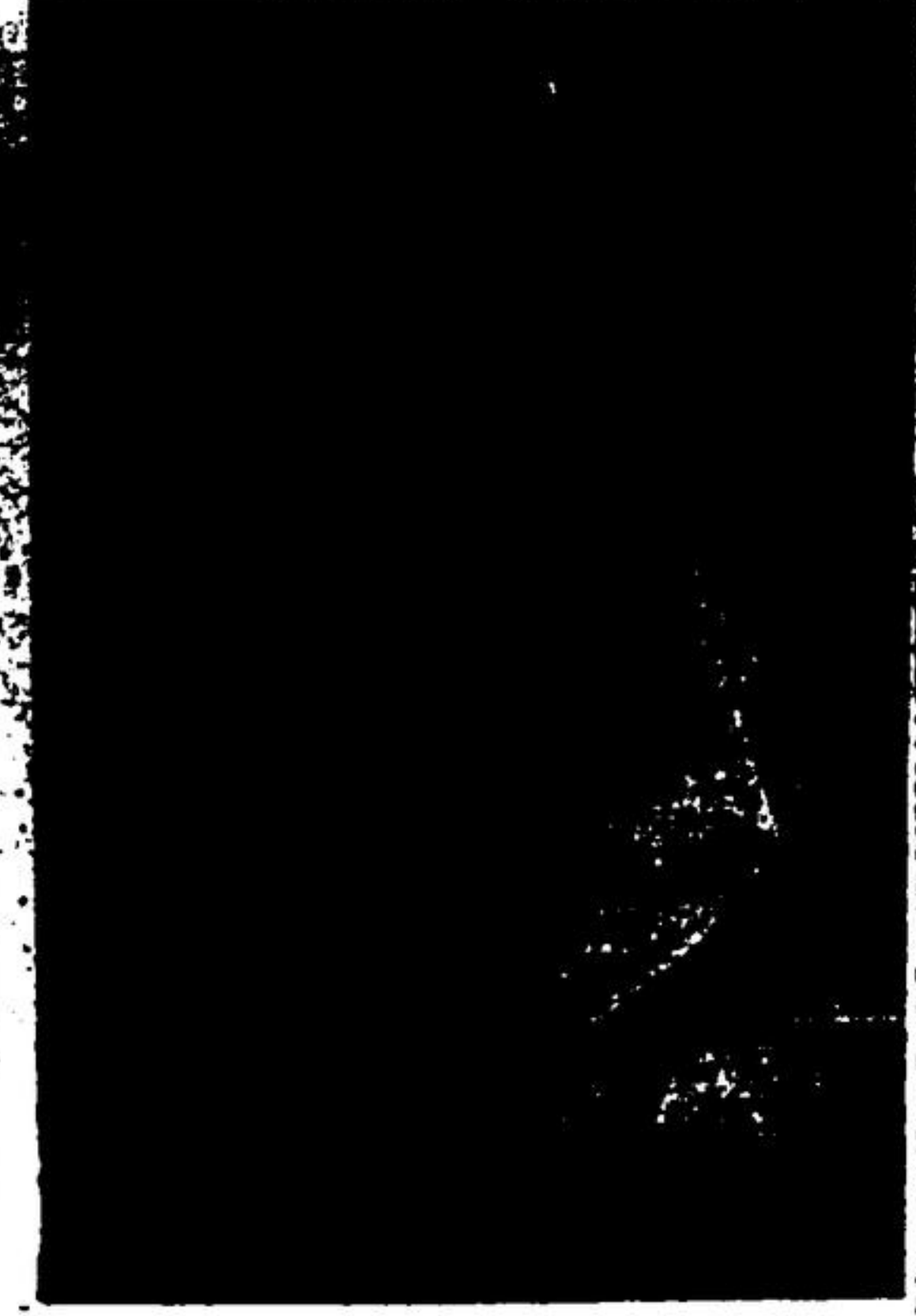

On August 4, Mr. and Mrs. B. Leslie Emalie of 18 Harcourt Drive, Guelph celebrated their fiftieth anniversary of their wedding, being entertained at dinner in The Amber Cupola dining room by their son, James D., and his wife, Ruth.

Included in the dinner party of seven were Ruth's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Burnham and Miss Anna Emalie of Norval. Mrs. Emalie wore a corsage of orchids.

At a surprise reception in the evening, Mr. and Mrs. Emalie were greeted by a number of guests, among them Jean and Gilbert Hammond of Aberfoyle.

Mr. Emalie is a graduate of the late Captain George H. Crowell of Shelburne, N. S. Mr. Emalie was born on a farm in Aberdeenshire. Their only daughter, Isabel, a graduate of McGill, died in 1954.

Bearing a letter of introduction to the president, the late Dr. James Mills, Mr. Emalie's first visit to the OAC was in June, 1903. In order to improve his knowledge of agriculture in Canada, he worked as a hay-

maker in Ontario and as a reaper and thrasher of wheat in Manitoba.

In January, 1904, he entered the service of the German Peasants Syndicate in Stroudport and, as their representative, returned to Canada in March, 1906. On the recommendation of the late Dr. Frank T. Shutt, first Dominion chemist, Mr. Emalie, in February, 1915, was commissioned by the Federal Government to undertake the preparation of a potato fertilizer from seaweed, for which purpose a government plant on Flat Island, near Clark's Harbor, N.S., was placed at his disposal.

This wartime mission successfully accomplished and having gained a wife in the process, Mr. Emalie joined the staff of the division of chemistry at Guelph.

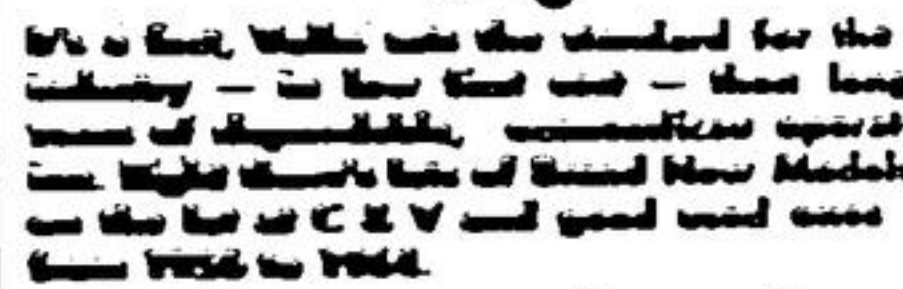
In 1922 Mr. Emalie became director in Canada for the Canadian Nitrate Committee. In December 1928, he engaged with Canadian Industries Limited to found their Agricultural Chemicals Division. As Technical Promotions manager, he remained with CIL until his retirement in 1944.

Mr. Emalie is a fellow, a life member and past president of the Agricultural Institute of Canada. After more than 18 years

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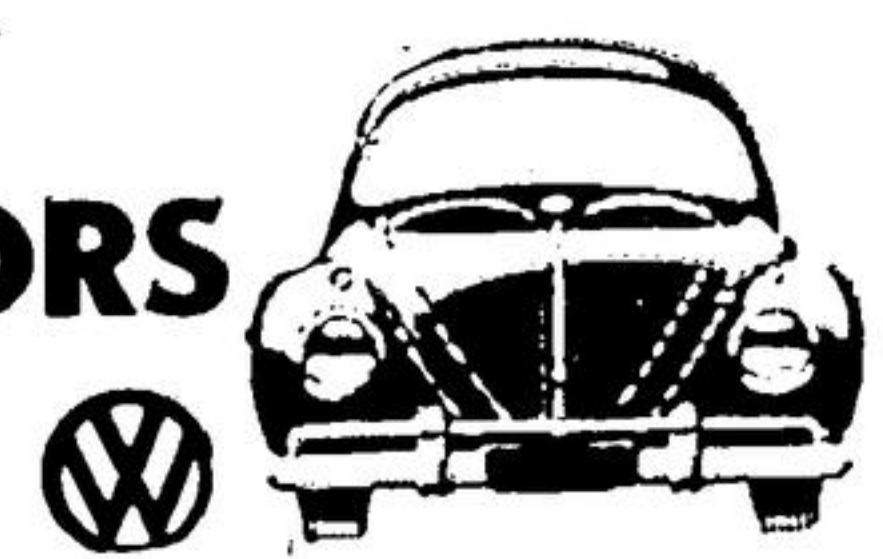


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
