The score remained 1-0 until the seventh inning when Erindale tied it up on a walk, stolen base and a single by Donnelly to score one.

The home boys came to life in their half of the seventh when Marzo singled with one out, was moved to second on Denamore's singles and when the Erindale fielder bobbled the ball, both runners advanced into scoring position. With two out, Doug Ford capped the rally off with a sharp hit to right field, scoring both Marzo and Denamore.

In the second half of the Juveniles' one-two punch, Danxy Arbie put down the high-flying Bramalea club shutting them out 2-0 on a fine 3-hit performance.

This moved the Georgetown crew past Bramalea in the standings into third spot.

Bramalea started with a bang getting two straight singles and filled the base when Arbie hit a batsman. He got himself out of trouble by striking out the final batter to end the inning.

Arbie struck out 17 Bramalea hitters, but had to get himself out of trouble as he hit 3 batters and walked three more at crucial times to get into hot water.

Georgetown collected 5 hits and scored their first run in the second on an error to the Bramalea shortstop allowing Arbie to reach first safely. Arbie then stole second and scored on Davison's single to centre field.

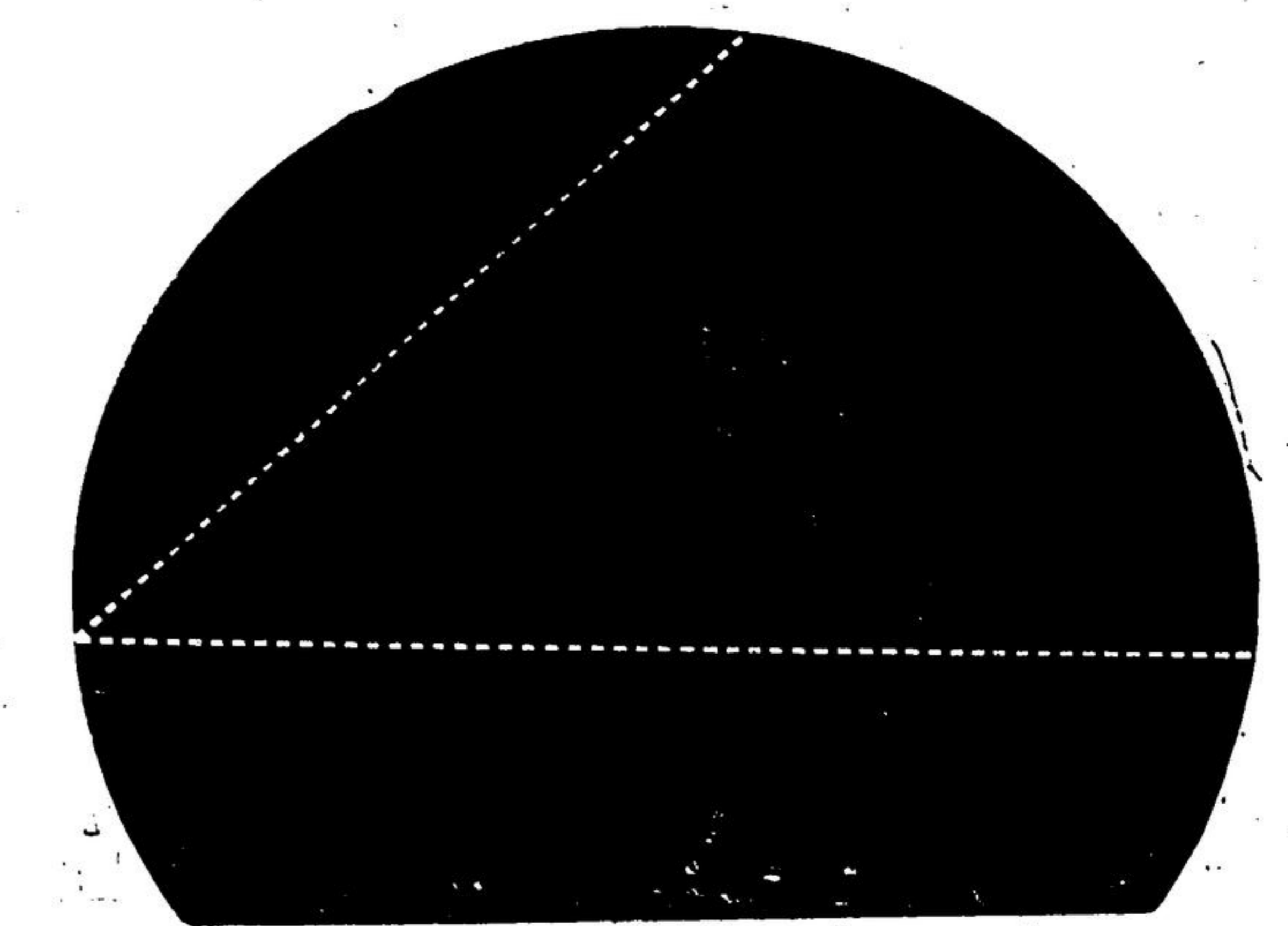
