## When You Sleep and Wash Water Figures Tell All

Monday is still washday in Georgetown. That's one of the things you can read between the lines of statistics in the daily log at the Georgetown water works.

These weeks, the three operating pumps at the Maple Ave. pump house are being called for in the neighborhood of 1,500,000 gallons every Monday which as a general rule is the peak day of the week.

Figures in the log book reveal other facts. There are more Georgetowners asleep between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning than any other hour. That's when consumption drops to its low point. And people prefer to water their lawns right after supper. The daily peak is usually registered between 7 and 9 p.m.

A million and half gallons a day, or slightly less, is a good average daily consumption of water in town, but twice this year, during the early summer drought the total jumped to over 2 million for a single day.

Holidays influence water consumption a great deal. This year, as in past years, the consumption has slumped its lowest point during the late part of July when Georgetown's major industries are running at half production.

Of course the low gallonage days of the week are Saturdays and Sundays with Sunday running consistently well below the other days.
