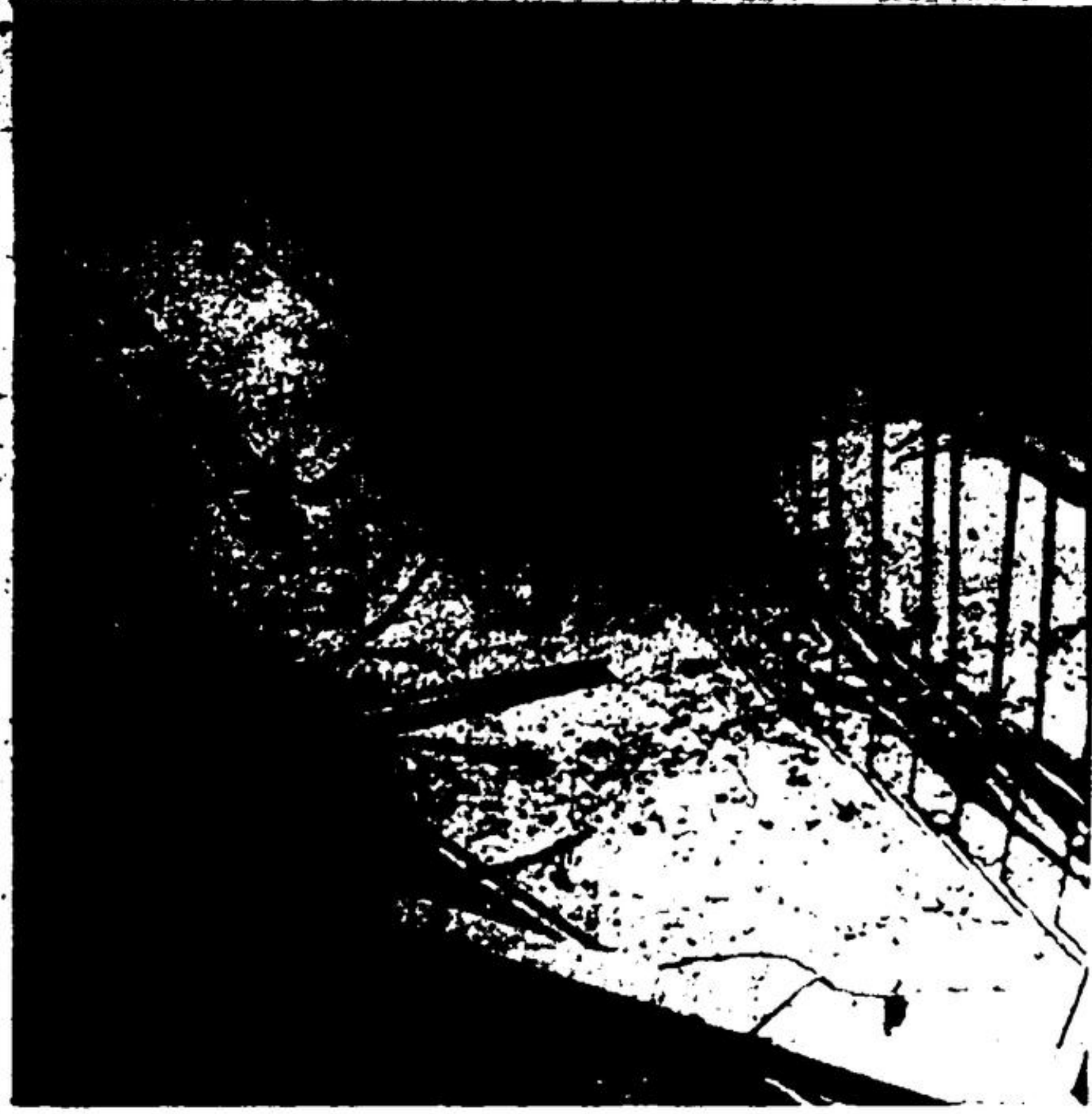


Construction on Span Started

A Healthy Lawn
Controls Weeds

There are three important factors necessary to have a real healthy lawn, which in itself is one of the best ways of controlling weeds. First there must be adequate fertility to support a thick growth of grass. Second, favourable weather; and third, weed competition must be at a minimum. The clovers and grasses have a fair chance to develop and expand.

Spring and Fall are the two times of the year most suitable for lawn improvement whether it be seeding, renovation or weed control. In fact the month of September is perhaps the better of the two as the temperature and moisture conditions are usually ideal.

When seeding a new lawn particular attention must be given to soil type as well as fertility. For example a medium to light soil is much better for lawn than a real heavy clay. The soil should be tested to ascertain the state of fertility and additional fertilizer applied when necessary. A free soil testing service is available at the O.A.C. in Guelph and through several commercial fertilizer companies. This precaution should also be taken when renovating a lawn.

Selection of seed is also very important. Naturally it's bad business to sow weed seeds, so be sure to secure a No. 1 grade of lawn seed from a reliable source.

Many lawn seeds can be controlled now according to the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Publication No. 529 - Weed Control In Lawns - contains pictures and control measures for nearly all lawn weeds. These fine books are available free of charge at the office of the Agricultural Representative in Milton or from myself.
