

District Papers Share In Best Paper Awards

The Nelson, Alberta, News swept the board in awards for weekly newspapers with circulation of less than 1,000.

The News, edited by Richard Hawk, was named best all round newspaper in its class and also received awards for the best editorial page and the best front page.

The Grenfell (Sask.) Sun placed second in the best all round category with the West Lorne (Ont.) Sun third. The Grenfell Sun also won the second place award for best editorial page with the Elora (Ont.) Express third. In the competition for the best front page the Okotoks (Alta.) Review was second and the Whitewood (Sask.) Herald third.

In competition for newspapers with circulation from 1,000 to 2,000 the Castlegar (B.C.) News placed first in the best all round category with the Acton (Ont.) Free Press second and the Portage la Prairie (Man.) Portage Leader third.

The Howe Sound-Squamish (B.C.) Times received the award for the best front page with the Clearwater (Alta.) Local Press second and the Kamisack (Sask.) Times third.

The Castlegar News won top spot in the competition for best front page with the Chesterville (Ont.) Record second, and the Port Coquitlam (B.C.) Herald third.

The Trenton, Ontario, Trenton was named best in the over 3,000 circulation class.

Two British Columbia newspapers, the Abbotsford News and the Chilliwack Progress tied for the second place in the overall competition and the Milton (Ont.) Canadian Champion placed third.

The Trentonian also took first place in the competition for best editorial page with the Abbotsford News second and the Powell River (B.C.) News third.

The Vernon (B.C.) News was first in the competition for best front page with the Courtenay (B.C.) Free Press second and the Burlington (Ont.) Gazette and the Midland (Ont.) Free Press Herald tied for third.

In competitions for papers with circulation from 2,000 to 3,000 the Williams Lake (B.C.) Tribune placed first in the best over-all category with the Ganouque (Ont.) Reporter second and the Mission City (B.C.) Fraser Valley Record third.

The Kelowna (B.C.) Mercury placed first in the competition for the best editorial page with the Ganouque Reporter and Williams Lake Tribune tied for second and the Prescott (Ont.) Journal third.

The Fraser Valley Record placed first in the competition for the best front page with the Williams Lake Tribune second and two Alberta papers, the Brooks Bulletin and High River Times in a tie for third place.

The Vernon (B.C.) News received top award for 1964 Christmas editions with the Steinbach (Man.) Carillon News

second and the Banff (Alta.) Crag and Canyon third.

Top award for local spot news pictures went to the Westmont (Que.) Examiner with the Campbell River (B.C.) Courier and the Port Credit (Ont.) Weekly as runners-up.

The Pierreford (Que.) North Shore News placed first in the

competition for the best sports page with the Williams Lake (B.C.) Tribune second and the Trenton (Ont.) Trentonian third.

The award for best women's news and feature content went to the Port Credit Weekly with the Wingham (Ont.) Advance-Times second and the Wadena (Sask.) News third.
