Lack of Inspectors is Slaughter House Snag

Gordon Lee, who operates one of the two slaughter houses in the Georgetown area, said last week that the lack of meat inspection is having a restricting effect on his business.

"I can't buy livestock, kill it and re-sell it uninspected," he stated. "The law prohibits that."

Mr. Lee said because of the shortage of inspectors his business has been limited to custom killing. He can slaughter and dress an animal that a customer wants for personal use.

He can't sell meat to butcher shops at least not until sometime next month when the province takes over the inspection of abattoirs in the county.

Until recent legislation brought a change, meat inspection was done by Halton County Health Unit, but the unit was forced to drop the inspection service in May because they couldn't find a sufficient number of inspectors.

Though the onus for carrying out the inspection in now on the shoulders of the provincial government, it isn't able

Two strong Halton County Shorthorn herds furnished strong competition at the C.N.E. The herd of R.W. Gardhouse, Milton, won the Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor banners, with S. G. Bennett, Georgetown, runner-up in both cases.

The Gardhouse senior yearling bull, Aberfeldy Field Marshall, was named grand champion bull of the show. His sire, Aberfeldy Royal Robin, had won similar honours three years ago. Other Gardhouse wins included: second and third in the youngest bull class, first in yearling bulls; third in the youngest female class; third in yearling heifers; second in breeder's herd; first in get of sire, and the three bull class.

Bennett's summer yearling bull, Scotsdale Valhalla, was named reserve grand champion of the show. The Bennett mature cow, Scotsdale Ruth Augusta, was named grand champion female. Her sire, Scotsdale Jupiter, is a former Toronto and Chicago Supreme Champion. Other Bennett wins included: third in oldest bull class; first in youngest heifer class; first in breeder's herd, and second in get of sire and pair of bulls.
