Guelph Students Planning Survey in Glen, Norval

What do they do on a rainy night in Norval — and Glen Williams in Norval — and Glen Williams is one of the questions that a team of students from the University of Guelph will be asking Sept. 23rd and 24th. In a letter read to Equating Council Tuesday night, permission was asked for the students from the Recreation Course at the University to conduct a survey of facilities for adult education and recreation in both villages.

Six students with proper identification will be in the area checking on arenas, swimming places, community halls, church halls, and opportunities for adult education. While most of the information and statistics will be available from municipal officials, they plan to call on some residents.

"It's just a courtesy to ask us for permission," explained Clerk K. C. Lindsay. "We wouldn't stop them anyway."

Mr. Y. J. Hurst complained to council of the dust on the 8th Line. "Is it so difficult to have the 8th line oiled more than once a year?" he asked.

Reeve G. Leale replied that the difficult was financial — "roads are our biggest problem and could, if we didn't watch it, take all our tax dollars."

In reply to Mr. Hurst's suggestion that the county might take over the road, the reeve felt this was unlikely since the 7th line was already a County road.

Mr. Hurst then went on to ask if he could pay for the easement on an individual basis, whatever it would take to do roughly 300 ft. in front of his house, which is between the 5th sidewalk and the base line on the 8th Line.

Council seemed to feel this was impractical, and equally impractical, his suggestion of writing the Department of Highways himself. "I think you'd be wasting your stamp," was the reeve's comment.
