If YM-YWCA Folds so Will Sixteen Supported Clubs

The YM-YWCA, on going into its fourth consecutive year of operation in Georgetown and District, is launching into what is probably the most ambitious program to date.

This has been brought about by several factors. First, more and more people have shown interest in Y activities, and therefore their wide tastes are being accommodated. Secondly, more leaders are being trained and becoming available to head the programs.

Thirdly, for three years the Y has operated on a very tight shoe-string budget, because never have the people of town and district given enough money in the annual campaign drive to fully support the projected programs.

This year, therefore, all those concerned with the Y are giving their all, to show the public not only what is possible, but also to show the need for such program, and the need for money to support them.

The are which the Y serves has over 5000 pupils enrolled in the schools; elementary, both public and separate, and high schools, an official told The Herald yesterday. Since the Y does

a great deal of its work with young people, one can immediately see the great need and demand for the Y's services.

A brochure has gone, or is going, into the hands of every elementary school pupil (with the permission of the principals concerned) which lists the coming year's program.

Here is what Georgetown and District has offered to it by the Y this year:

Gymnasium — boys and girls 8-11 years old.

Judo — boys 6-15, all girls, men 16 and over.

Badminton — adults.

Bowling — 10 pin — 14 years and up, and adults.

Tennis — offered next spring and summer.

Ski Club — beginners and adults.

Craft Clubs — boys and girls, Gra-Y-boys of grades 6, 7, and 8.

Junior Y Teens — girls grades 7 and 8.

Ill-Y Groups — girls and boys from grades 9-13.

Y Co-Ed Club — teenagers.

Leaders Club — All Y leaders.

Handicapped Club — for handicapped persons.

Day-Camp — a summer program for boys and girls 6 and 7 years of age.

So-Ed Club — a group for young adults, single and married.

Ladies Take a Break — a morning program for housewives, with baby sitting available.

A Naturalists Club and Campers Clubs are under organization.

Club programs, over and above those listed, could be offered if interested people enquire, if leaders are available, and most importantly, if there is enough money to support them.

"Anyone desiring additional information on any of the above programs is invited to phone the Y office any Monday, Wednesday, or Friday afternoon, 877-6163, or drop into the office, 14 Main Street W, and pick up a brochure," says a Y press release issued last week.
