### Says Reaction Favourable to Milton-Georgetown Free Calls

Reaction to the proposal that would link the Milton-Georgetown calling area has been favourable according to Toronto area manager L. Bailey. Mr. Bailey whose territory includes Milton and Oakville, made a statement last weekend at a Chamber of Commerce dinner at which A. H. Blachford, Georgetown area manager was the guest speaker.

Mr. Blachford outlined details of the Bell proposal which will allow two-way calls between Milton and the Oakville, Georgetown and Burlington exchange buildings.

He said calls would jump six to 10 times what they are now between the exchanges if the extension is approved. The rate change was not "pulled out of hat" he said, but was according to a graduated scale depending on the variations in the number of telephones in the local service area.

"Not too bad," was the opinion of another Glen Williams resident Jack Hooper, owner of cottages at Oakview Beach, Wasaga. "We weren't booked solid, but averaged out all right." Although he admitted it had been poor summer weather, he felt people went away anyway.

Mr. Blachford outlined details of the Bell proposal which will allow two-way calls between Milton and the Oakville, Georgetown and Burlington exchange buildings.

He explained reasons for the raising of Milton customers basic rates should the proposal be accepted.

"Reaction to the proposal seems to be more favourable than unfavourable," said Mr. Bailey.

He said 3,200 letters explaining the proposal and the rate changes were sent to Milton customers and if people don't reply it is assumed they are in favour of the project or consider it inevitable.

"The results are sent to the Board of Transport commissioners for inspection before any change is made by us," Mr. Bailey said.

He said if the proposal is accepted the extended two-way calling area could be in operation sometime in 1967.

He said the Bell proposal was a result of a survey of Milton exchange customers which showed that over 55 per cent of them call at least one of the Oakville, Georgetown or Burlington exchange numbers at least once a month.

"It would be reasonable for us to assume that we should do toll free service when 55 per cent of our customers indicate they want to reach these points so frequently."

From an informal survey of local people in the summer resort business, it would seem that lodges or cottages, which had to be reserved ahead of time, were not as much affected as the picnic and swimming areas. Here usually a spontaneous decision is affected by the weather.

According to Mrs. L. Wolf, of Wolf Park, "It wasn't too good, since the water didn't get a chance to warm up, but the swimming pool, a smaller area did get a bit warmer."

It was the same story at Waterfalls Playground, owned by the Langridge's of Limehouse. "We had some good days, but on the whole business was down," said Mrs. Langridge.

Active in the stone quarrying business for most of his life, Allan W. Norton, 80 died in Georgetown Hospital on September 6.

Mr. Norton was the son of James and Mary Jane Allen Norton. He was born in Glen Williams, spent his youth there and for the past 51 years had made his home at Limehouse.

Mr. Norton opened a quarry at Limehouse, later sold it to Sam Hurst for whom he managed it, then managed the Rogers & Hurst Quarry north of Glen Williams. He later purchased the old Logan Quarry and operated it for several years under his own name.

Rev. Norman Young conducted the funeral services last Wednesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, and interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery. Pallbearers were Ross Norton, Jack Norton, Jim Bailey, Wayne Mason, Allan Norton and Bill Campbell, Hamilton.
