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Split Hockey League Beavers in South Group

Georgetown Beavers of the Ontario Hockey Association's Central Junior C League will be facing the same teams in the 1965-66 season that they met last year but with not the same frequency.

At a league meeting in Stratford Monday night the 12 team loop was rendered sideways making North and South Divisions. Last year the league was split the other way with the two conferences labeled East and West.

Georgetown has been placed in the South division, grouped with Milton, Dundas, Simcoe, Paris, Brantford, and will play two games with each of these clubs. The balance of the schedule will be made up of single games with each of the North division teams New Hamburg, Hespeler, Preston, Elmira, Orangeville and Hanover.

The top eight teams at the end of the thirty-two game schedule will go into playoff quarter finals.

Although a schedule was not drawn up, the tentative date for Georgetown's home opener is Sunday October 31.

Georgetown Beaver president Scotty Patterson, who attended the Stratford meeting, told The Herald that a general meeting of the club and interested public has been called for Sunday Oct. 17 at 2 o'clock in the arena Rose Room.

The Georgetown club, the youngest in the league last year, will lose just three players because of the age limit this year.
