Dale Mitchell, Bob McKay, Jim Eagles, Cal Coolidge, Ray Burrows, Pete Lavell, Dave Underhill, Bob Smith, Jim Blair, and Jim Weirich. The last two were unexpected faces in at the first practice since both were elsewhere during the 1964-65 term.

A number of Juniors making the jump, and some strangers to the game have also impressed. Included in this group is Phil Lavell, who will likely get the nod as starting quarterback, Doug Ellis, Wayne Turcotte, Don Parsons, Larry Bradley, Bob McKeagemy, and Stas Kymersley.


Close Fought Game, Rugger Beavers Edge Irish 6-3

The Glen added another pair in the third and two in the fifth.

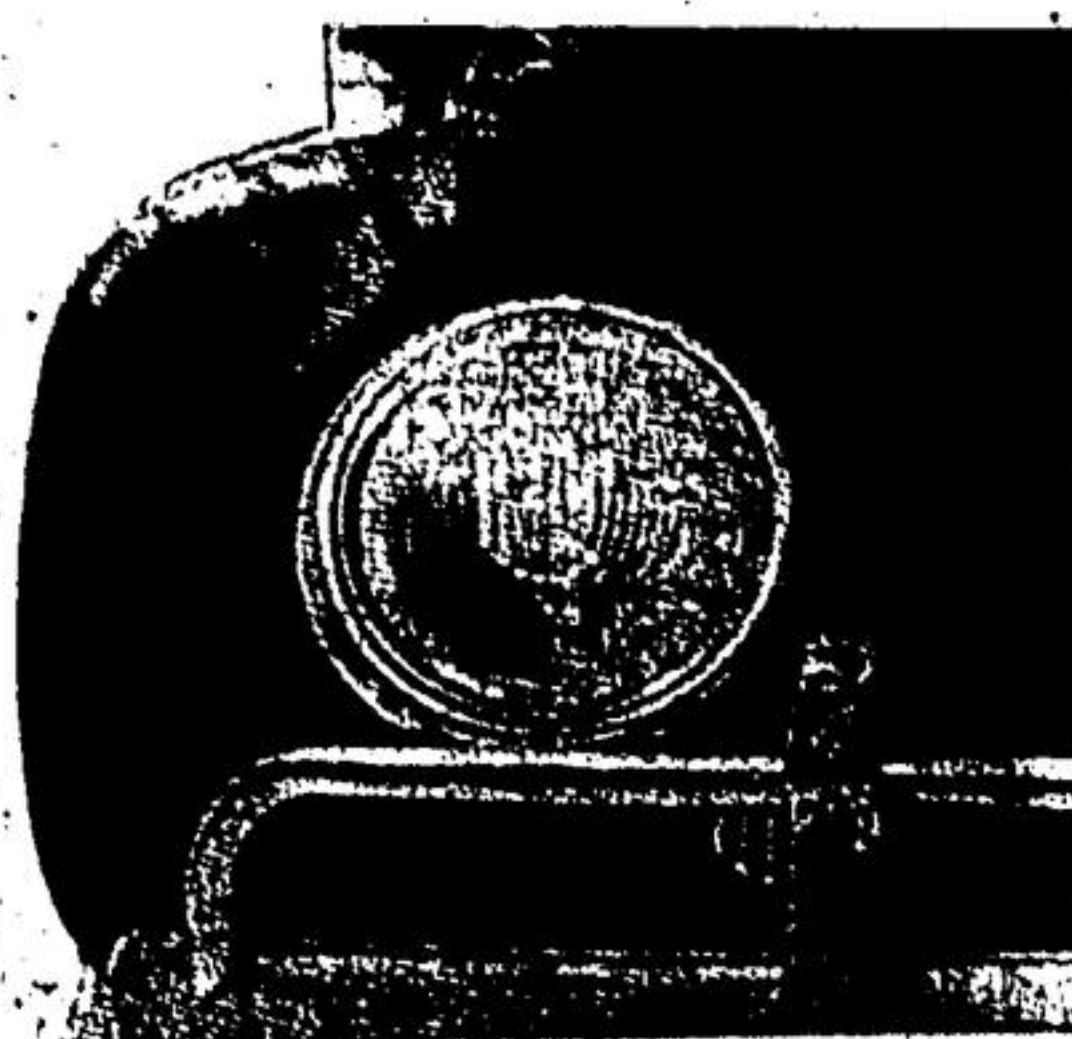
Second game of the series will be played Thursday night in Hornby, and the series shifts back to Glen Williams Monday night for the third game.
