St. Jerome's led 34-0 at the half but were held to just 8 points in the second half.

"The way our fullback, Phil Mayah, performed, especially on charges up the middle, and Barry Cook's punting were the only bright spots," said Thompson. "But we'll be heard from before the season is over," he predicted.

The Georgetown juniors were hurt the worst on the outside running and it is this part of the defense, plus offensive timing that is being polished in daily workouts this week.

Coach Thompson summed up his team's offensive showing this way — "The first time we got hands on the ball we marched for 15 yards. After that we went nowhere."

He'd like to even his record tomorrow by surprising the always tough Bishop Macdonell squad. The meeting will take place in Georgetown park.

Ice Making Starts, May Be Skating on Saturday

Georgetown Memorial Arena manager Don Goeling was directing the laying of the first flood on the arena floor Tuesday morning to start building an ice surface just two and half days after the summer's roller skating program concluded there Saturday night.

The ice making operation is about two days ahead of last year's schedule.

Goeling told The Herald that the actual ice making operation started first thing Monday morning when the arena pump started forcing brine through the miles of pipe under the floor to bring it down to freezing temperature.

He said that with a break from the weatherman there will be public skating at the arena Saturday night from 7 to 9 o'clock. Ice thickness by then will be a little more than a quarter of an inch.

The roller skating program it appears, was the summer drawing card that the arena board has been seeking for some time to make the building a year round entertainment centre.

There were 51 public roller skating nights held this year at which 5,818 rented roller skates. Season end figures show 4,700 admissions by people with their own skates and 1,521 spectators.

Glen snapped the knot when Marlene Webster doubled in the 6th, and scored on Audrey Weir's three-bagger. Audrey Weir carried the 3rd run home when short stop Kay King hit safely.

The second hit and the first base runner was caught away off the bag and was an easy final out.

BADMINTON BIRDS IN FLIGHT AGAIN

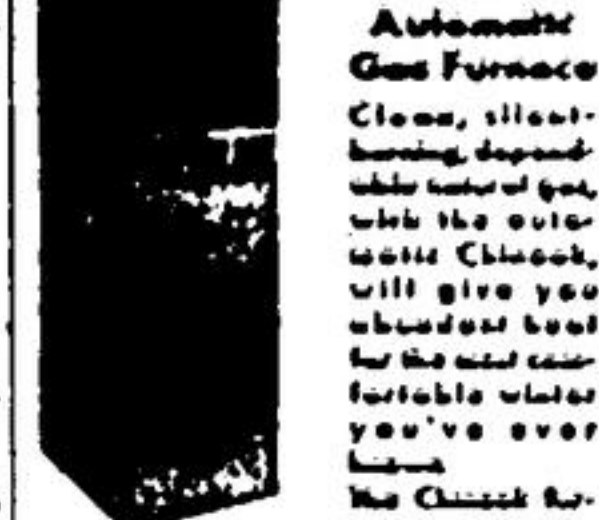
