


ANN SAYERS WED IN OTTAWA

A late model Pontiac was completely wrecked and its three occupants injured when the vehicle collided with the side of a bulldozer on Guelph St. opposite the KIA store Sunday night, Sept. 25.

Treated in hospital by Dr. Al Macintosh were the driver Thomas Leo Power, 35 Raylawn Circle, and two other local men Terrance Break and Thomas Finnamore. Finnamore, the most seriously injured, received a dislocated hip, and lacerations. Break suffered a bump on his head and sore arm, and Power's out chis and broken rib.

Police said the car they were riding in was eastbound on Guelph St. along the middle of the highway under construction when it rammed the huge bulldozer. The machine is owned by Armstrong Brothers Construction.

Damage to the car was placed at \$2,000. The complete front end, windshield, dash and left front door were written off. The collision took place at about 9:20 p.m.
