Rebel Seniors Blank Opposition Two Games Straight, Seek Third

Ninety-two points scored, and none allowed—that's the eye-opening record that belongs to the Georgetown high school senior football team. The Rebels, this week, with 3 CWOSSA District 10 league games behind them.

The Rebels looked sharp in fattening their totals Thursday with a 62-0 demolition of the Fergus high school senior squad. Their first win was a 30-0 coup over the highly touted St. Jerome's team.

But football coaches are a hard breed to satiate and Georgetown Rebel mentor Lys McLaren's reaction after Thursday's romp was typical.

"It was too easy," McLaren commented. "We didn't get a chance to employ a sustained offense. Our touchdowns, in many cases, were scored from midfield and consequently Phil (quarterback Phil Lavell) never got the opportunity to direct a long march and call a real series of plays."

The best example of this was when Georgetown established a record by scoring three touchdowns in their first five offensive plays of the game.

Coach McLaren started yanking first stringers and inserting his backup men after the three major scores, but the totals continued to mount. At half time the Rebels held a 47-0 advantage. In the second half Georgetown went to some of the plays that coach McLaren had had doubts about in practice and they still produced another 15 points.

The Rebels introduced some offensive frills and one of them a full back pass play, went for a 60 yard touchdown. Another, a head blocker play in which the quarter back tosses a screen pass and the receiver flips to a moving backfielder, went for good yardage.

Jeff Nurse scored three touchdowns, all on ground plays,

making it six majors in two games. Mackenzie scored one on the full back pass from McKay, Burrows scored twice, once on a pass and once on a reverse, McKay took a screen pass into the end zone, Pete Lavell made a spectacular end zone catch, and Jim Blair caught a rollout pass for the final touchdown.

Fred Cowbrough's educated eye converted 5 of the 9 touchdowns. One convert was boosted by Phil Lavell on an alert play. Lavell, who holds the ball for Cowbrough on the converts, had to move out of position because of a bad snap
