

## Seek \$1000 from Town Fund Contribution

Assistance from the town in the current YMCA financial campaign was asked Monday by W. Carter of the campaign committee.

Explaining the costs which the Y he asked the town to grant \$1000 which would be equally split between rent and equipment expenses.

"And perhaps another \$500 to the spring to assist with our membership training program" he added.

Mr. Carter said it is the first time council has been approached for direct help. Leaders first wanted to prove their program and he cited success of

such activities as summer day camp and judo instruction as such.

"Counsellors worked for \$5.00 a week at the day camp" he said "and we can't expect this every year."

Mayor Gibbons expressed his personal interest in the Y, as did Reeve Elliott. But the reeve said there is nothing in council's budget for a donation.

Cr. Smith said rather than a hasty decision, he would like to examine his recreation budget, to see if at least some equipment could be purchased by council. The request was left for committee study.

## Skating Club has Second Pro—Hire Ross Garner

A new skating professional has been engaged by the Georgetown Figure Skating Club.

Club president Clifford Johnson told The Herald the hiring of Ross Garner for the upcoming season was one of many moves being made by the executive to improve conditions in the club.

Mr. Garner, trained by World Champion trainer Bruce Hillyard, will join Mrs. Marilyn Barber on the professional coaching staff.

Mr. Johnson said a second professional was needed because of the growth of the club and to afford the members even closer supervision.

Other features of the season which commences Oct. 23 are the introduction of the Canadian Figure Skating Association's new testing system for Juniors; the new plan by which members reaching the age of 14 become eligible to become C.P.S.A. amateur coaches; a plan by which the pupil showing the most potential will be sent to summer school for one week; and a

fund raising draw with a trip to Jamaica for two or \$500 cash as first prize.

The October 25 starting date is later than usual because of a hockey school which will occupy the arena for the preceding two weeks.

The figure skating classes will be held every Monday commencing at 3 o'clock with the pre-schoolers and concluding at 10 o'clock.

The club will be guided by the same executive this season as last. They are president Clifford Johnson, secretary Mrs. Eileen Hawitt, treasurer Mrs. Daphne Mooney, promotion and publications Mrs. Sadie Johnson, ice committee chairman Mrs. Donna Moore, and committee member Mrs. Joan Chisholm. The carnival committee members are Mr. Paul Barber and Mrs. E. Lewis.

Mr. Wood got action when he was promised a minimum bill for his water.

The mayor said he would do what he could about drainage, but Cr. Smith said the only solution is a storm sewer to absorb inadequate grading when the subdivision was built.
