Archiving Trees Give Way To 7th Line Widening

Work on the widening of the 7th line, from No. 3 sidereal to Ashgrove has been started, and with it has disappeared the arch of trees, which shadowed the road.

The road is being extended to a hundred feet in width, which takes an additional seventeen feet off both sides of the road.

The work is being done by Halton County work force, and equipment, with other work of equipment being subcontracted when necessary.

At the same time, widening of the 7th line at the south end, from No. 5 highway to Oakville is being done by King Paving Ltd. at a cost of \$214,200. Eventually the whole 7th line will be reconstructed.

The wood from the felled trees is available to anyone willing to take it away, but it is suggested that the foreman on the job be consulted.
