Six Families Ousted by Friday Downtown Blaze

The Georgetown Red Cross Branch disaster committee lodged six families in the Mc-Gibbon Hotel and purchased clothing for those who needed it after fire did an undetermined amount of damage to the Cordaro building and contents on Main St. N. Friday.

Earl's Flak and Chip and Wright's Barbershop also suffered water damage.

Worst damage was done to an apartment at the rear of the third storey where the blaze originated. Two rooms, a kitchen and sitting room, furniture and clothing belonging to Mrs. Lynn Ross were written off.

John Alderson, 19, Loses Life in Auto Accident

A young Georgetown resident was killed Saturday when the car he was driving missed a curve on a sideroad near Everett.

John Harry Alderson, 19, lost his life in the accident. A passenger Sandra Duncan was treated in hospital for minor injuries. Two others were uninjured.

Mrs. S. G. Walsh, co-chairman of the disaster committee said the Red Cross accommodated the homeless in hotel rooms from Friday afternoon until Tuesday.

Police alerted the fire department and as soon as the trucks arrived two firemen, William Hillier and Ace Bailey entered the smoke filled top storey to determine if anyone had been trapped.

Inspectors from the Ontario Fire Marshall's office have been asserting the result of the blaze yesterday and today. No estimate of damage is expected for three or four days, but is believed to be in the neighbourhood of \$8,000 to \$10,000.

John had lived in Georgetown for the past three years, boarding with his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Erwin Lewis, 22 Normandy Blvd. He was employed in Brampton with Canadian Baker Perkins, Ltd. He was spending the week-end with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Alderson of Alliston, who are former Georgetown residents.

John also leaves a brother Rick, 31 and sister Sharon, 16. He was a nephew also of town residents Mr. and Mrs. Charles Crawford and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Jones.

Concerted opposition to moving the Georgetown municipal offices from a downtown location was expressed by a group of 30 businessmen who appeared at Tuesday's council meeting.

Fire Chief Erwin Lewis said his department had the flames under control a half hour after arriving on the scene. Mopping up operations started about two hours after the fire was discovered.

Chief Lewis said an accurate estimate cannot be made until the water that found its way into every part of the building dries completely.

The expansion, the first phase of a planned further expansion, is a 117'x150' concrete floor right behind the present plant.

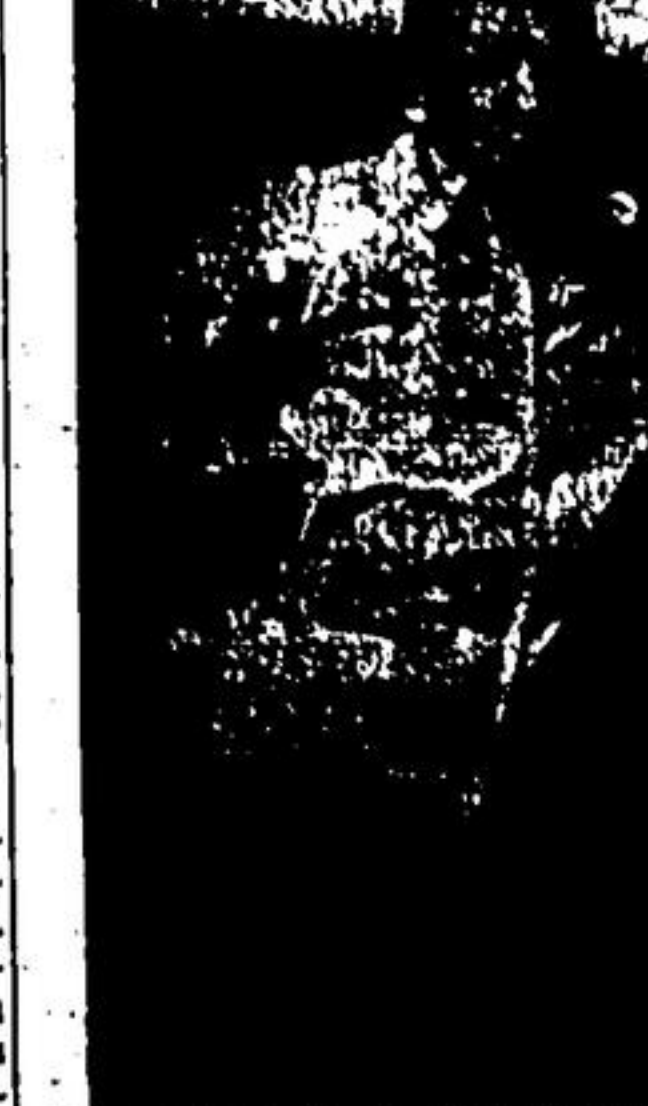
The large concrete floor complete with drains and pipes, will be the base for a new building next year, and is being constructed by McNally Construction Ltd.
