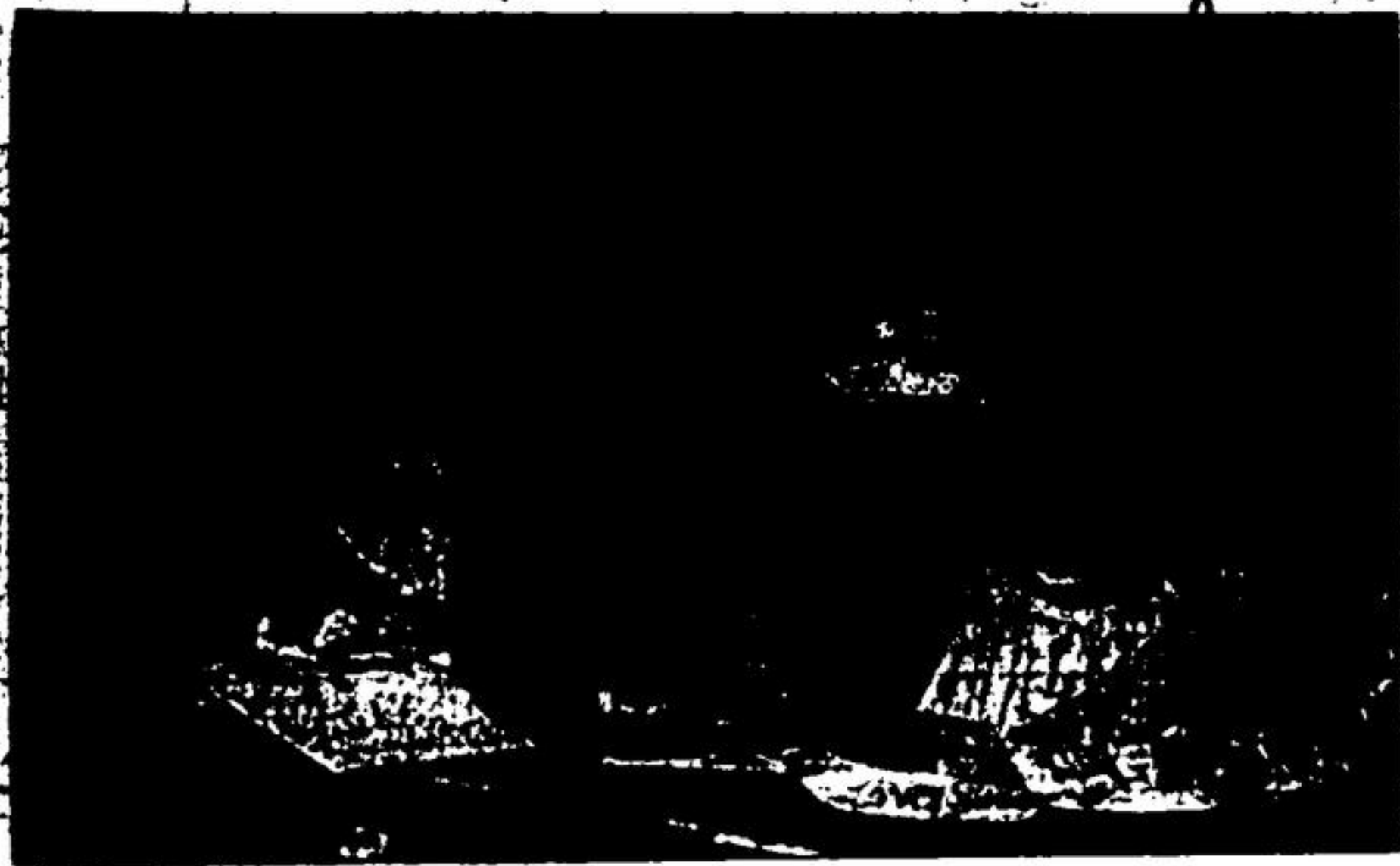


Georgetown Youth Helping to Arrange Conference on Alcohol Problems

Electric Clothes Dryer Stops Washday Drudgery

Ever lifted the family automobile, and held it over your head?

Or hung out a washing for a family of five on a clothesline?

The same amount of energy is required, it has been estimated, to carry out both tasks.

Washday drudgery is a thing of the past for the homemaker with an electric clothes dryer. No longer does she have to lug heavy baskets of wet clothes, stoop to lift the clothes from the basket and stretch to hang them on the clothesline. Nor does she have to repeat the whole procedure, in reverse order, to bring the dry clothes into the house.

Electric clothes dryers also save time for the busy homemaker. With a damp-dry setting on the dryer, clothes can be removed when they are just right for ironing. And much of the laundry load does not require ironing. If an electric dryer is used, towels, dishcloths and dispers, for example, are fluffy and wrinkle-free at the end of the drying cycle. Wash and wear fabrics are dried and "pressed" at the same time, requiring only a touch up with an iron.

One of the most practical electrical appliances in the home, an automatic clothes dryer is designed with the homemaker's crowded schedule in mind.

Stage Players Rehearsing Amid Ghosts Of Georgetown's Past

The words of Shakespeare's *Taming of the Shrew* are echoing around the walls of the old town hall on Cross Street these days, where silence has reigned for the past quarter of a century.

Bringing it back to life are the Little Theatre Group rehearsing for their October 28th, 29th and 30th production of *Taming of the Shrew*.

Upstairs in the now dilapidated auditorium, with a few signs of past grandeur in the wood panelled ceiling and carved balcony remaining, Patricia (Ron Hill) tries to tame the shrew Katharina, (Vera Macdonald) with sweet words, siled and abetted by his servants used to grace the tower of this building, and was used not only to call the firemen in the time of need, but strike the hours of seven, twelve, one and six.

However, in 1931 the bell tolled for the building itself, and the municipal building was moved to its present site, which

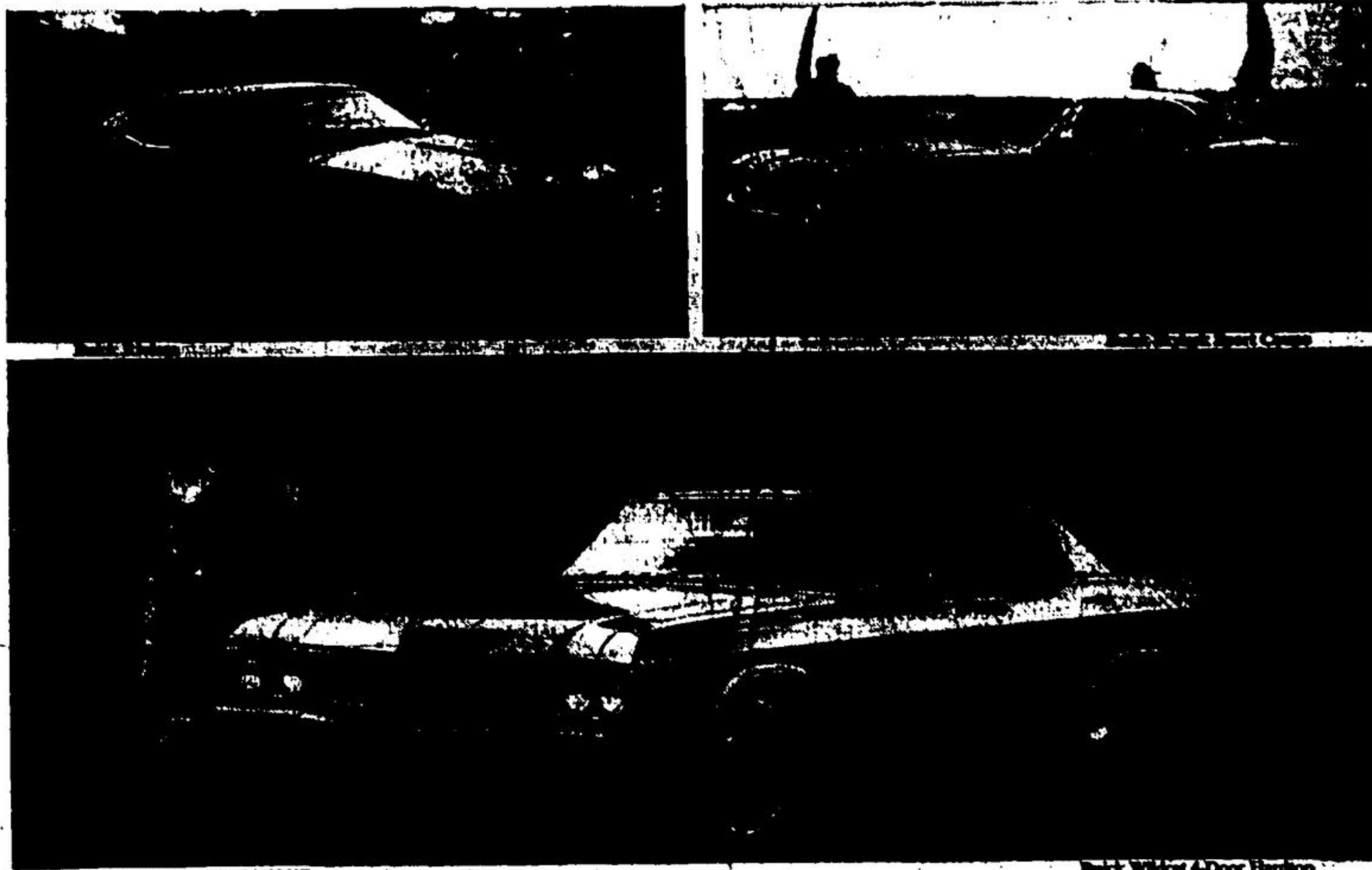
