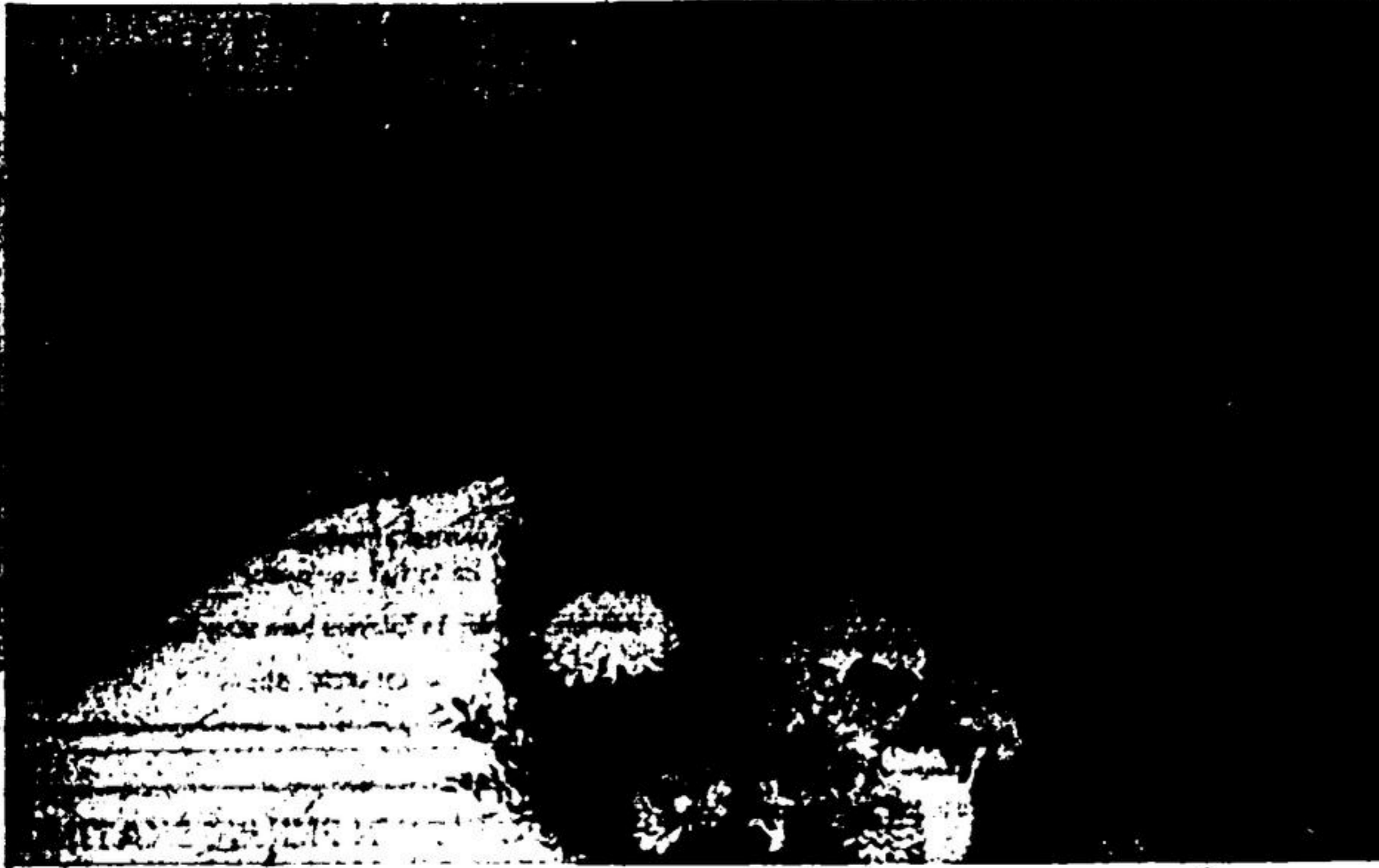
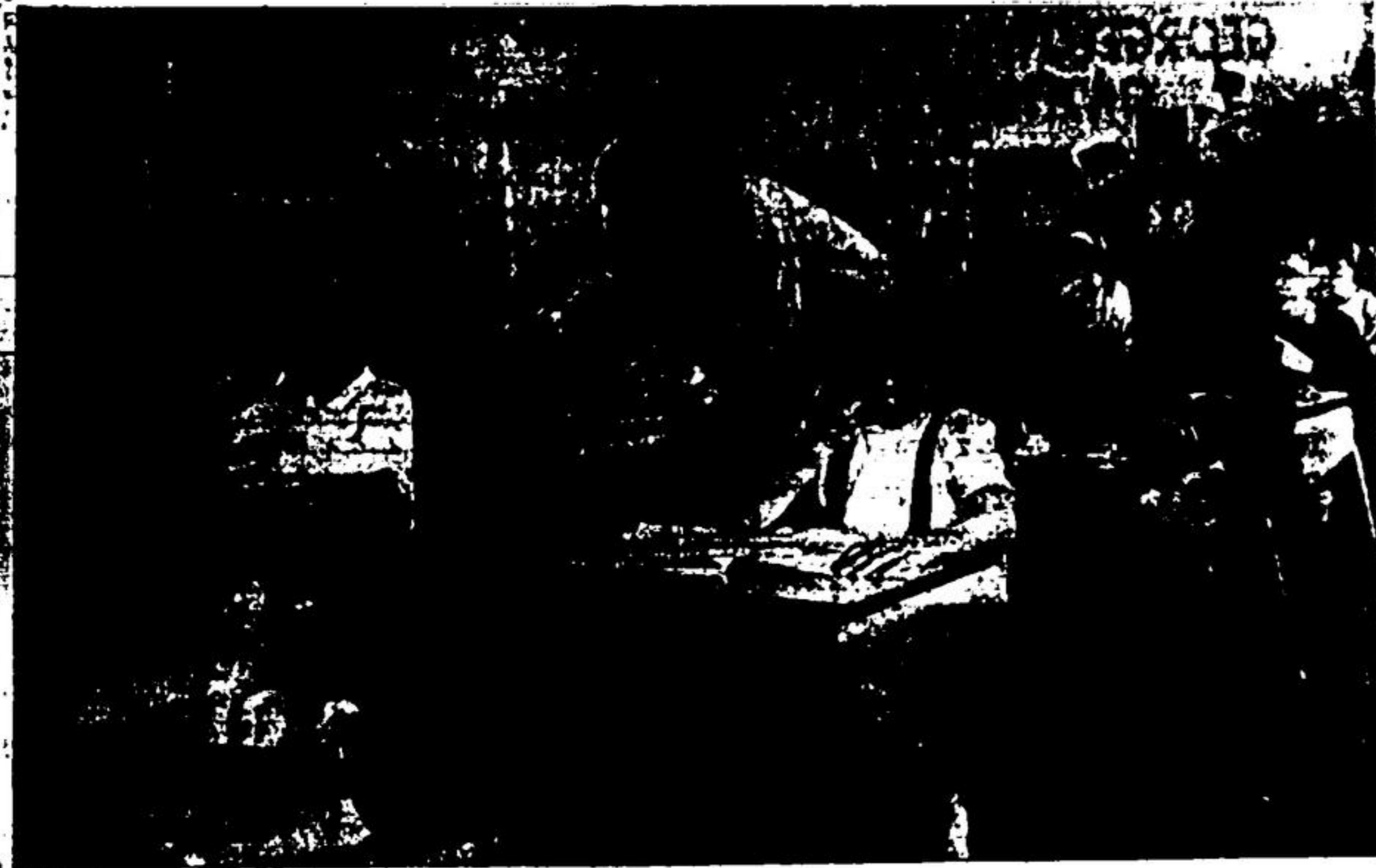


Explains Christian Education At New School Dedication

Mr. Plunkett, a Montreal municipal consultant began the study in August. The importance of the study was emphasized by the Ontario Municipal Board's refusal last week to grant Milton's application for annexation at least until the study is completed.

Public hearings beginning in March, were announced in advertisements appearing last week in newspapers in the two counties.

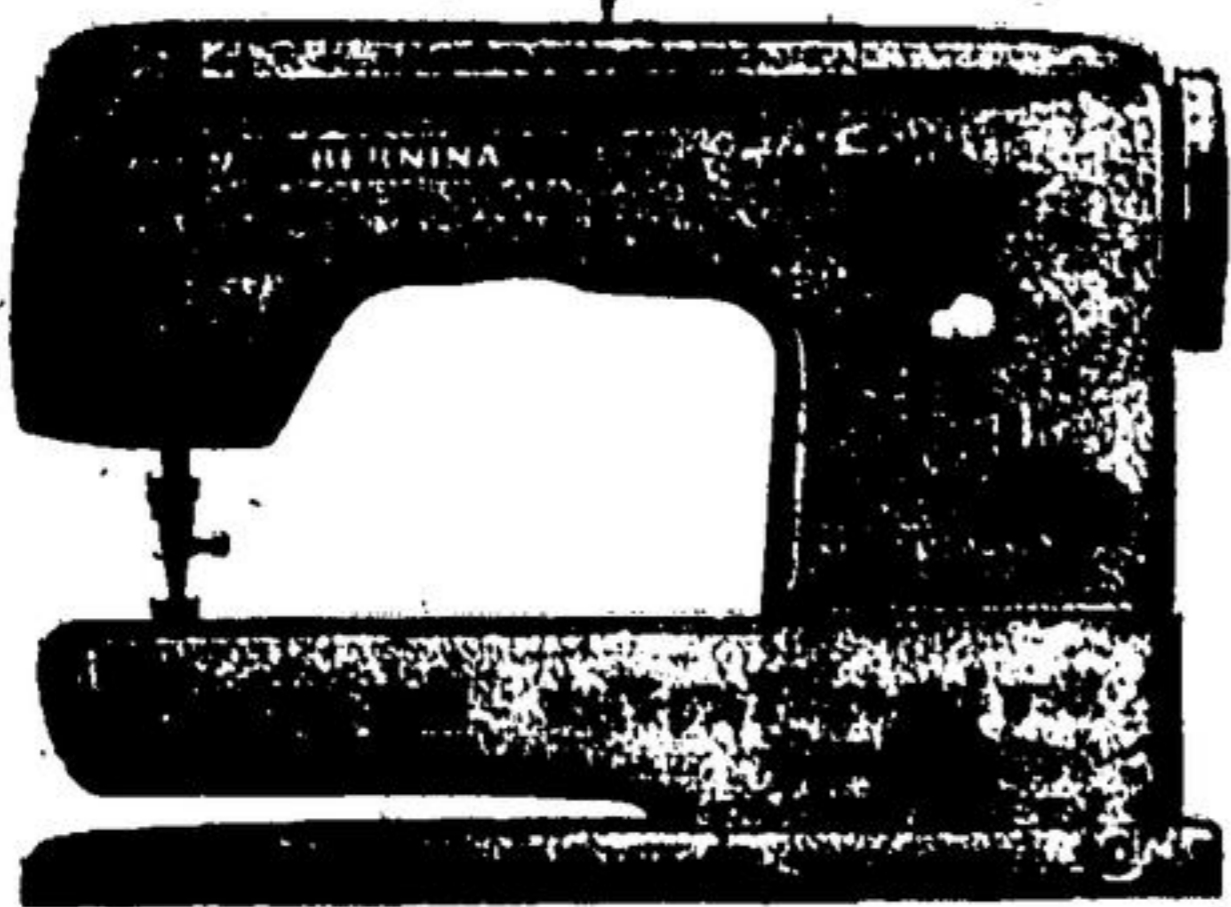
Members were asked to help make the day a success by being on hand to help during the day, which begins at 10:30 a.m. and lasts through until 4:30.
