Bill Wilson Sweeps Class, Kart Races

Ask Halton Golf Shareholders to Approve Further Construction

A motion to proceed with the balance of the 18 hole construction project at North Halton Golf and Country Club will be tabled at a general meeting of shareholders Wednesday October 20.

The first phase, now nearing completion, was authorized in October of last year at a special general meeting at a basic cost of \$32,250.00 with authorization to go to \$37,000.00 to cover the cost of necessary additional irrigation, sand for traps and other incidentals.

The overall project to convert the North Halton course from 9 to 18 holes was split into three phases, with the first phase to include:

- Construction of seven completely new greens.
- A new, larger putting green.
- Ten new tees, larger than any of the club's present tees.
- Three completely new fairways, and five half fairways over property previously unused.
- Creation of a practice fairway and tee adjacent to the clubhouse by the freeing of a former fairway. This includes a practice green for chipping.
- Provisions for a new causeway to cross the pond to the first hole.

In a progress report to shareholders last week the North Halton club's board of directors stated that some work on all parts of phase one has been done, and that many of the parts have been completed and turned over to the club.

The directors stated in the report that since they feel it their duty to consider when the balance of the 18 hole project

be proceeded with, they endorse the work be continued with following the completion of the present phase.

They listed the factors influencing their decision as:

- A favourable price available.
- The serious and successful challenge of the membership market by two neighbouring golf clubs who have the advantage of being 18 hole courses.
- The brightening economic and industrial picture in and around Georgetown in connection with recent land release agreements.
