Industrialist Irate Disputes Hydrant Bill

Arthur Klee, owner of the Deltacrafts Manufacturing Co. is becoming increasingly irritated about the problem of a water hydrant on his River Dr. property.

Early this spring, Mr. Klee complained to council that while the hydrant is on the firm's property, it is not needed for fire protection there, and he objects to paying a monthly rental charge.

This week he received a bill for \$428 owing on the rental with a letter that water service would be discontinued if it is not paid.

In a letter to council he pointed out that Reeve Hunter and Cr. Hewson had assured him in the spring that the town would purchase the property on which the hydrant sits for the amount of the water bill owing.

"I've heard nothing further until this request for payment," he said "and I insist that the matter be settled in the next few weeks."

If not, Mr. Klee promised that he would alert the daily and trade press for his next appearance before council, "and will expose exactly what the town is prepared to do for an industry."

Cr. Hewson said the necessary documents for settling the

problems are in the hands of the town solicitor.

Mayor Gibbons said the land is not worth the \$428 and termed it a liability if it is taken over.

"It's most unusual to buy property for a water account," he said.

Deputy Reeve Hunter pointed out that the hydrant benefits area residents and that if the firm capped the hydrant houses would be without fire protection.

"One policy for everyone" answered the mayor. "The account should be paid until the hydrant is removed."
