

Inspection Blitz Checks For Local Fire Hazards

Highlights of this year's Fire Prevention Week activities was the annual inspection blitz of schools, commercial and industrial buildings. It was carried out Oct. 6 in Acton and Georgetown with 1 firefighters and 13 insurance company inspectors participating in the "blitz." The Georgetown Insurance Agents' Association and Acton Insurance agent W. H. Denny arranged to have the insurance adjusters for the day-long tour of inspections.

The Bureau sponsored a noon dinner at Georgetown Golf Club, and the Georgetown agents held a supper in the evening for Bureau officials and those who participated in the project. Special guests who spoke at the noon dinner were Acton Council's fire committee chairman Deputy-Reeve Roy Goodwin, Georgetown's fire chairman Councillor Hill Smith, Fire Chiefs M. Holmes of Acton and Erwin Lewis of Georgetown, Halton Mutual Aid deputy coordinator Chief A. E. Cleland of Milton, Esquering Deputy-Reeve Wilfrid Leslie, and Jack Armstrong representing the Georgetown Insurance Agents' Association.

Chief Lewis chaired the dinner, and noted "this will show the community what we can do when the insurance people and the firefighters work together on preventing fires. And

prevention is always better than the cure." Mr. Armstrong said he felt this annual reminder to residents to check for fire hazards was an excellent idea. "Through the year people in schools, industries, businesses and homes are inclined to forget the little things that go with fire prevention," he added.

Elsewhere during Fire Prevention Week, individual fire departments conducted various programs to impress the need for fire safety on the public. Oakville Fire Department held an extinguisher demonstration for about 70 men representing local industries, conducted fire drills in schools, and stopped at the home, industrial and

commercial inspections that are carried out regularly through the year.

Burlington Fire Department conducted school drills, distributed literature, showed films and held open houses in all three fire stations. The Milton firefighters paraded their fire-fighting equipment around town, with a loudspeaker announcing fire prevention week. They also held an open house at the fire hall where over 400 visitors saw films and demonstrations of the dangers of household spray cans.

Acton and Georgetown departments, besides participating in the one-day blitz, held fire hall open houses, distributed literature and showed films.

The Santa Claus Parade chaired by Lion Jim Jones was extremely successful. This annual event staged at a cost of \$1,400 will be held Saturday December 11th this year.

The Lions sponsored the Canadian National Institute for the Blind drive for funds and

Where does all the money come from? The Lions' Club is embarking on an active year under the leadership of Lion Chief Fred Zorge. Many projects and activities are planned.
