


Halton Girl Furrow Queen Plans Veterinary Career



Vera Thompson Measures Depth of Furrow

A 17 year old Halton County farm girl became Ontario's Queen of the Furrow when she was crowned Friday at the International Plowing Match at Milliken.

Vera Thompson was one of 13 contestants. She is a Grade 13 Nelson High School student in Burlington and formerly held the title of Queen of the Furrow for Halton County 1964.

Shortly after his daughter

was applauded by her royal subjects, her father Gordon who has farmed in the Milton area for 32 years explained his daughter planned to attend the Guelph Veterinary College after graduating from high school.

He said only two weeks ago his daughter had won the Nelson High School senior track and field championship.

Vera expects to go into research work upon completion of her course at Guelph.

The Queen was presented with a 48-piece set of crystal. All of the contestants received make-up kits.

Irene Lawrence, 18, of Milton came second and Donna McKenna, of Wolf Island, came third in the Furrow Queen contest.

Miss Thompson received her crown from former Queen of the Furrow Sharon Wylie of Oakwood.

Fined Despite Plea That Accident Location Vague

Despite his lawyer's plea that no evidence was produced during the hearing of a charge to indicate in which township the offence occurred, an Acton man was fined \$25 Wednesday for failing to allow one half the road for traffic near Norval.

William Mackie, a lawyer who the week before was allowed hearing adjourned to present argument that when a defendant pleads not guilty all evidence must be clearly brought out into the open, and location and township must be in the evidence, was overruled in a similar attempt Wednesday.

After evidence of William Patterson, an Ontario Provincial

Police constable, Mr. Mackie asked that sentence be reserved until next week for argument.

He noted that altho' the constable had said the offence occurred on Highway No. 7 near the 4th Line, nothing was said of the township.

Magistrate Burger, in overruling the motion said evidence of it being near the 4th Line and a witness' statement that it was west of Sampson presented a fair indication of where the incident had happened.

The incident was an accident involving the accused. He was proceeding east of No. 7 Highway when his car was in collision with one driven by an elderly Fruitland woman.

A witness said he was east-bound on Highway No. 7 when the accused passed him in a solid line zone. He said the Acton man was in the west-bound lane when the accident happened.

The woman said she did not remember what had happened and was unconscious until she woke on an operating table at hospital.
