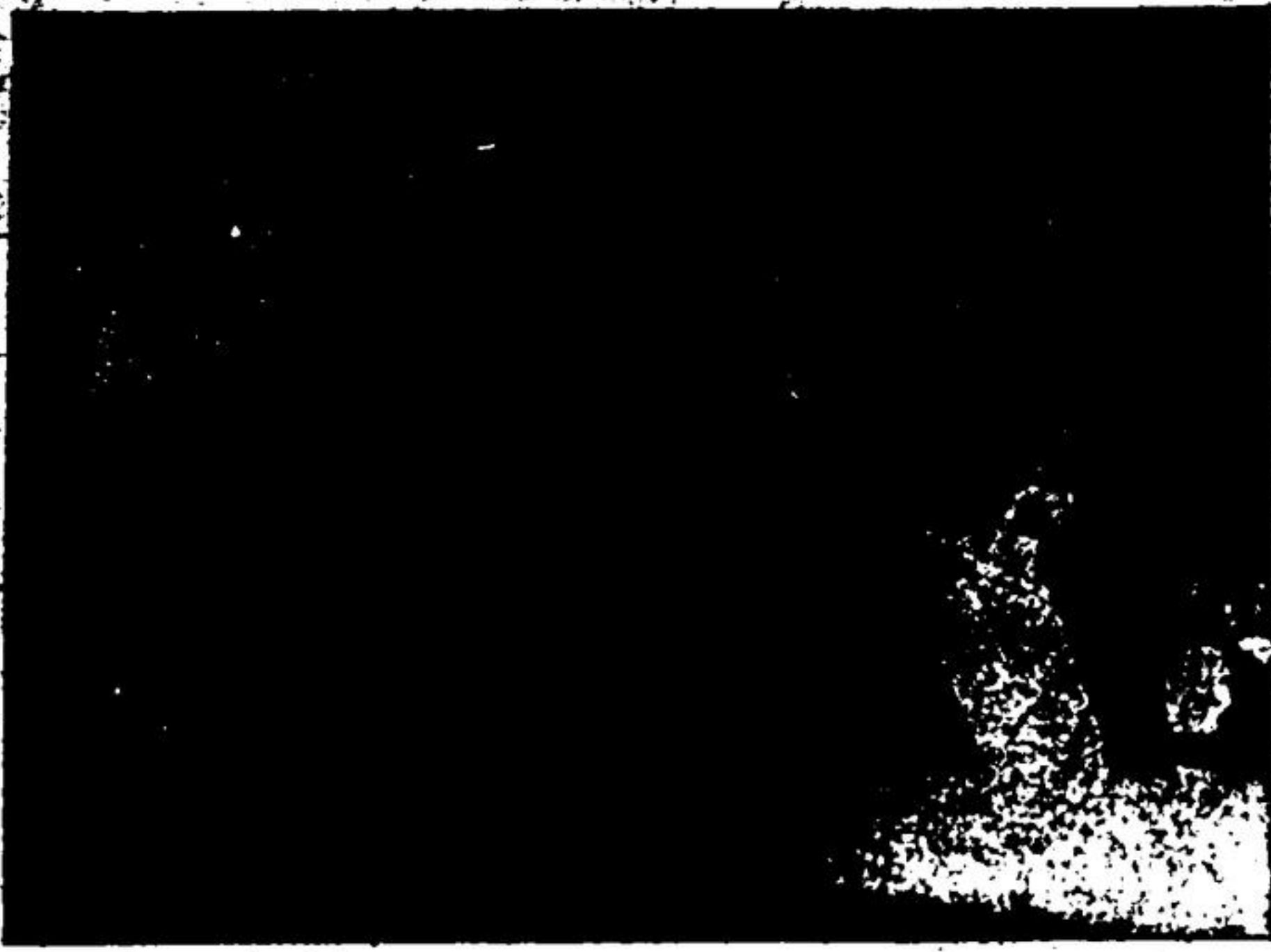


Survey Suggests Acquisition Of More Terra Cotta Property

A plan for the development of Terra Cotta park, devised by Canadian Mitchell Associates for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, has been completed.

The plan was explained in detail by James Knox, a director of the firm, who was closely associated with the project.

The plan suggested to the Conservation Authority is that it should attempt purchase of property to the north and east of the park area in order to gain control of the water flow through the park. The flow is such that it could be easily diverted.

It was also stressed, by the survey firm that before any development is undertaken in the park area, the road leading to the park should be repaired.

The survey of the firm suggested the main entrance to the park area be moved further south to eliminate the present congestion around the main gate, caused by the parking area and the swimming facilities in close proximity to the present entrance.

Besides, it was pointed out the new entrance and the accompanying road would separate the proposed daytime facilities on the north side of the road from the proposed overnight camping facilities to the west and south of the larger of four ponds in the park area.

On the south and immediately adjacent to the entrance road, it was proposed to create an area for nature study and bridge trails which could "double" as ski trails in the winter. To the west of this in the open meadowland, it was proposed to have a picnic and recreation area. The largest pond on the area could be stocked with fish and used for fishing with perhaps a docking arrangement at the east end for non-power operated boats.

Immediately to the west of this large pond would be the overnight camping area. The daytime area would continue

where the present entrance is with increased parking and a permanent comfort station constructed. A smaller pond to the north and west of this could be stocked for "junior" fishing, and this pond could be "ringed" by a scenic drive along the escarpment to give a magnificent view south over the whole park.

It was proposed also that a games field might be constructed on the south shore of this "junior fishing pond."

The survey indicated the Authority might want to undertake this development over a period of the next 10 years, and realized that couldn't be done all at once because of the financial aspect involved.

"The suggested plan was devised," said Mr. Knox, "to make the best possible use of the available area of the park."
