

The Georgetown Militia Regiment handled one of its toughest assignments Saturday.

The selected patrol was one of four competing for the General George Kitching Trophy at Camp Petawawa, which was won by the Hastings and Prince George Regiment of Belleville.

"Exercise Arthur Three" was the final exercise in the initiative and leadership championships. The Lorne Scots Patrol came first in the semi-finals held at Camp Borden a few weeks ago.

Their performance was of

special significance because Lorne Scots recently won the Sir Casimir Guskowski Trophy for being the top infantry regiment in Canada.

The General Kitching Trophy is a gleaming silver sword set in a rough hewn rock that was one of the corner stones of the old University Armoury in Toronto.

The local group of 25 soldiers and officers under Captain Frank Ching and Lt. Bobt. Goddard left Brampton armories at 8:30 Friday and arrived at Camp Petawawa at 4:45 Saturday. They travelled in no army bus.

Most members of the patrol had a 30 minute sleep after their arrival at the camp and some had none at all before the commencement of the final exercise.

The patrol completed the three-and-a-half hour exercise successfully against regular army soldiers who drag netted the Lorne Scots with the most up to date war machinery including airplane patrols.

The Lorne Scots were armed only with rifles and bayonets. Army officials said the Lorne Scots were not flown into Camp Petawawa because there were not enough planes available.

Colonel John Bryan of Central Command who directed the exercise followed the entire course of the scheme.

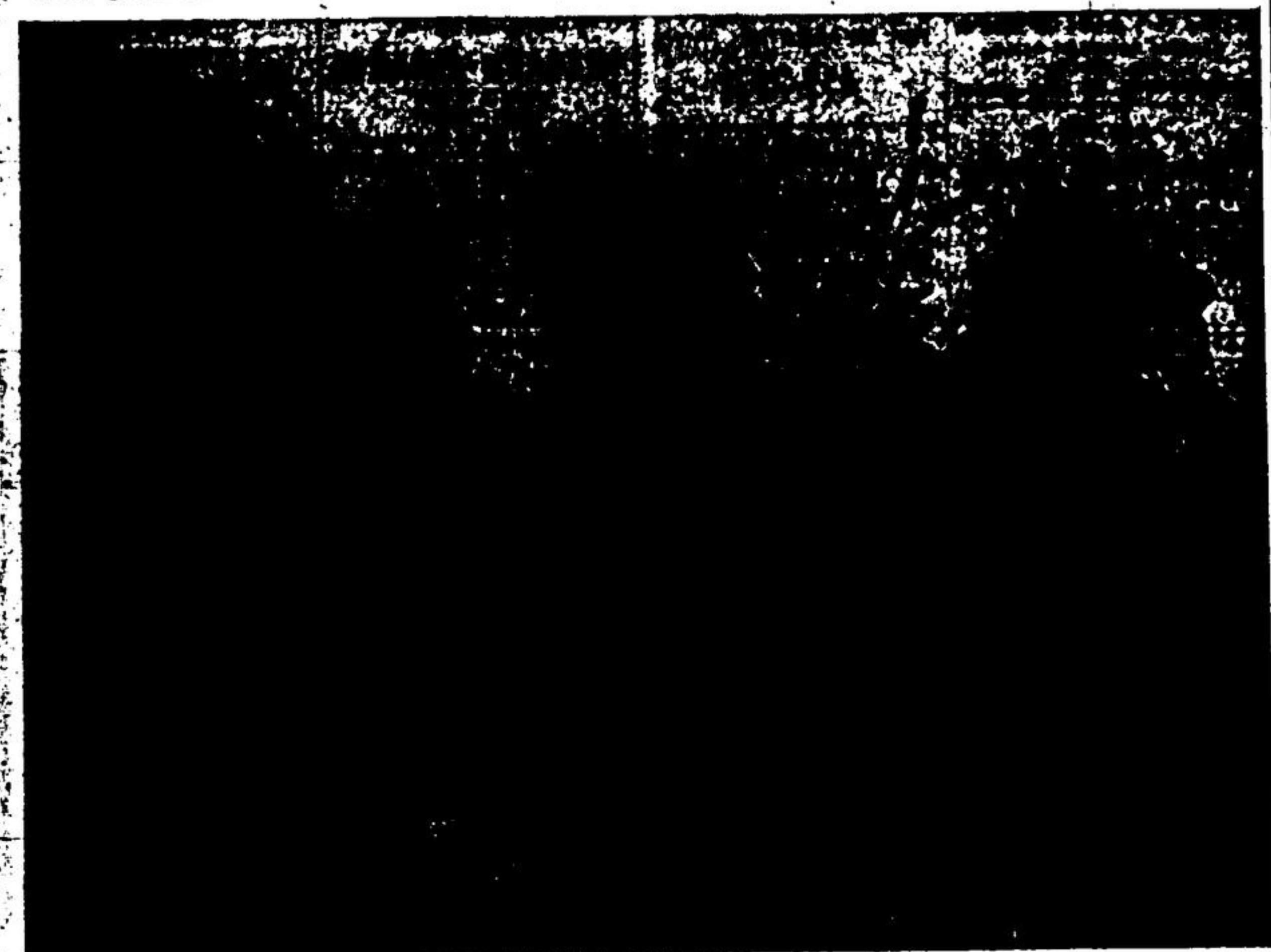
