Stress Alcohol Dangers At Meeting of Toc Alpha

At a Toc Alpha youth conference on the problems of alcohol co-sponsored by Georgetown and Milton teenagers Friday and Saturday Thomas A. Knott, director of youth work for the Ontario Temperance Federation told his young audience that society is very confused in its attitudes to alcohol. The conference was held in St. Paul's United Church, Milton. 10-21

A society where the myth is maintained that "holding your liquor" is a trait of masculinity, but where the alcoholic is recognized as a sick person. 10-21

A society that laughs at the drunk but condemns the drinking driver. 10-21

A society where beer commercials on television show young people rioting in floods. 10-21

A society where telecasts of hockey games are co-sponsored by an oil company and brewery which turns out a product associated with impairment of driving. 10-21

Mr. Knott accused the breweries of trying to lure the youth full rather than adult viewers to a particular brand of beer. 10-21

"Don't let them con you. Think it out for yourself," he said. 10-21

"I'm not here to twist your arm," he said. "You have three choices concerning alcohol. The first is abstaining, the second is to become a moderate drinker, but since we are not living in a moderate society it is difficult to define moderate." 10-21
