

# Must Have Land or Move Location, Says Ferro

Presidential Steel expects to expand within the next two years if market conditions warrant, but the firm cannot find land to do so within the next six months, council was told Monday in a letter from the firm.

President William Ferro, in his letter, said it is impossible for the firm to fulfill conditions set by the town in acquiring a 24-acre tract adjoining its Armstrong Avenue plant. The land is in the industrial subdivision being purchased by the town from Dalrex Developments.

If the land cannot be purchased, he said, the firm would have to look elsewhere for a location which could guarantee its future expansion.

Last week council accepted a purchase offer of \$1,000 an acre.

# Should Have Stayed To Fight Says Mayor

Criticism of Georgetown's new and deputy for joining a without of council council in a dispute over a regional jail was expressed by Mayor Gibbons at Monday's council meeting.

"I would seem Georgetown was poorly represented when we had no members of a meeting which was still in session," he said, in launching his attack. "Wouldn't it be better to stay and fight rather than walk out?"

Deputy Reeve Blumler explained that if the drastic action had not been taken, a plan to build a joint jail for Haldimand and Wentworth would have been carried, and it would be an expensive proposition for the county.

Georgetown council members have a lot of four votes, compared with Burlington and Oakville's 17, he said.

"There's two ways of beating a motion," remarked Reeve Blumler. "We caused a further investigation. The county could well spend some of this money on recreation facilities to help keep people out of jail."

"That's another lame duck explanation," answered the mayor. "The deputy Reeve told me once that it's just one happy family at the county and they seldom ever have a recorded vote. I certainly don't represent Georgetown here by walking out when I'm against something."

The Reeve said if the mayor had been in his position, he would have stayed at the meeting, the motion would have been carried and Haldimand would be spending \$300,000 on a regional jail.

"But don't you expect the matter will come up again?" said the mayor.

He said the Reeve was a member of county council when the south part of the county had the balance of voting power.

"And you let them talk you into giving the south equal voting," he continued. "You got yourself and the town into this mess."

"You've never been at county council to know what goes on there," answered the Reeve. "The south still hasn't the balance of power, but in this case, the Nassagoyes Reeve and Acton deputy were voting with them."
