

Governor - General Vanier Presents High Scout Award

The woman who was largely responsible for starting Scouting and Guiding in Norval, and Scout and Cub groups in Norval, was honored in Ottawa Saturday.

Years of service as a Wolf Cub leader by Mrs. John (Elna) Ellis, 83 Church St. E., Brampton, was recognized at Governor-General, Ottawa. The governor-general, Georges F. Vanier, Chief Scout of Canada, invited Mrs. Ellis with the Order of the Silver Acorn, given for specially distinguished services to Scouting.

Mrs. Ellis' interest in the Scout movement began in 1925 as a Scout Auxiliary member in Scarborough. Transferred to Brampton in 1932 by the Bell Telephone Co. she became Alpha of 1st Brampton Cub Pack. Her interest did not stay within the confines of this group. Recognizing the need of more leaders as interest in Scouting increased, she recruited and trained leaders to new groups which were opened. Mrs. Ellis was responsible for the majority of the Scout and Cub groups in the area. Her committee, Scout-Cubmaster of Rosales Park in 1950 and was District Commissioner of Brampton in North Peel County since that time her efforts have been confined to North Peel District.

Mrs. Ellis was one of nine representatives to the first International Leaders Conference at Epping Forest, Eng., in 1952. She has been on the staff of world jamborees and one of our Canadian jamborees. The Girl Guide movement in Brampton received her assistance in 1958 when interest was revived. She assisted in training leaders and still assists with various committees.

Apart from North Peel District, she helped to organize, train leaders, assist at meetings in the 1940s when Scouting and Guiding groups were started in Norval. Mrs. Ellis was Alpha of 1st Norval Cub Pack in 1954-55.

As recent as five or six years ago Mrs. Ellis assisted with formation of Scout and Cub groups in Norval. She went to Toronto, helped plan the meetings, set up group committee, contacted the commissioner, both area and district, and received their help. She stayed with the group until she was satisfied leaders were trained sufficiently well to instruct the Scout and Cub.

Halton county's population has reached a total of 141,276, an increase of 5,717 in the past year, or 4.22 per cent. The county is now one of the most heavily populated in Ontario.

Oakville gained 1,867 inhabitants, and now has 50,956. Burlington's population increased by 3,778 to 58,311. Milton, with an increase of 63, now has a total of 8,446. Georgetown gained 93 for a total of 11,472, but Acton's population declined by nine to 4,768.

The population of Equestrian township rose by 278 to 7,163.
