

# Tarzwel Farm is Prepared For Halton County's Plowing Match

Plans have been finalized for the Annual Halton County Plowing Match and Farm Machinery Display, on the farm of Howard Tarzwel, R. R. 2, Georgetown, on Saturday, October 20th. Mr. Tarzwel's farm is on Lot 8, on the 3rd Line, Township of Etobicoke. He has one of our top herds of Holstein cattle, having won the Premier Exhibitor Award for the last 2 years at the Milton Fair. At the time he is just completing a new dairy barn on the farm.

Eight different classes are available for plowmen, with entries to be taken at 9:00 a.m. and the drawing of lands at 10 a.m. The day's activity will be under the leadership of Clebert McDowell, field manager, assisted by Geo. Headhead.

A horse shoe pitching competition is to be held again this year. A new trophy is the Geo. K. Elliott Memorial Trophy presented by his wife to the youngest Halton contestant.

In the afternoon the Halton Queens of the Furrow competition will again be held, with young ladies between the ages of 16 and 25 competing for the numerous merchandise awards and the honour of representing Halton in this competition at the International Plowing Match next year.

At seven o'clock that evening a Banquet for all plowmen and friends will be held in the Masonic Hall, Milton, with the Hon. Ray Connell, Minister of Public Works, as guest speaker. Tickets are available from the Plowmen's Association directors, and at the Agricultural Office, Milton.

Last year's Plowing Match was one of the most successful in the Province, with fifty-seven

entries in the plowing classes. With the success of our local plowmen at the International Plowing Match last week, this year's Halton County Plowing Match should be another great success.

## Building Delay Could Cost Manor Some Federal Grant

MILTON — Halton Centennial Manor is faced with the possibility of losing much of \$200,000 in Federal building funds.

Delays to a \$1,400,000 extension to the municipal retirement home on Highway 25 will almost certainly make it necessary for building to be continued past March 1, 1966.

Ottawa has set this date as a deadline by which the project must be completed in order to receive Federal funds.

Failure to finish on time could result in the loss of federal dollars.

"Strikes during the summer have caused the delay," said K.A. Allen, manager of the 236 bed home for aged residents.

He said the 150 bed extension now under construction was jointly sponsored by the Federal and Provincial governments on a 50-50 basis.

"They're keeping us on pins and needles," said Gordon Gallagher, the chairman of the Halton Centennial Manor Committee and Neave of Burlington.

Other projects throughout the country are also under the same unnecessary shadow, he added.

The Centennial Manor construction is Federally financed under the Federal-Provincial Municipal Works Assistance Act which loans money for municipal projects.

## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Do you gamble when you play bridge? I don't mean for money, I mean for points. Do you ever say "The first thing is to make the contract, then I'll try for overtricks." This is a gamble. You weigh the value of an over-trick against the value of the contract and the contract comes first, as it should.

Have you ever said, "I can play the hand down one but if I gamble to make it, I'll be down three." Again you usually try to make the contract.

You can gamble for points on defense as well. An excellent example of this occurred last week at a rubber bridge match.

North-South are vulnerable and the dealer is South.

East and West missed one gamble when they didn't go six clubs. This goes down only two tricks which doubled would be 300 points. But the gamble I wish to talk about is one in the play.

West lead the singleton spade and dummy goes down. Now West has two aces and dummy has one. South's 5 diamond response to the Blackwood 4 no trumps shows one ace. It has to be in spades.

West can see only two tricks for the defense, the heart ace and the club ace. This is not enough to set the contract. Where can they find another trick? Not in clubs, not in diamonds from the bidding and not in hearts, since they will split favourably. The setting trick must be in spades and it must be a spade ruff by West.

South wins the lead with the spade ace and immediately leads a trump. West must win the first heart lead and gamble. The gamble comes in trying to get a spade ruff. West cannot see all the hands. But he knows that either his partner or declarer must have the king of clubs.

West gambles 30 points for an overtrick against game and rubber, 600 points, on defeating the contract, that his partner has the king of clubs. West should lead a low club. When

West wins with the king he will know that his partner underled the ace. He will think about West's desperate play and realize he must do something. The return of a spade is rather obvious considering West's original lead.

West ruffs the spade and the contract is defeated.
