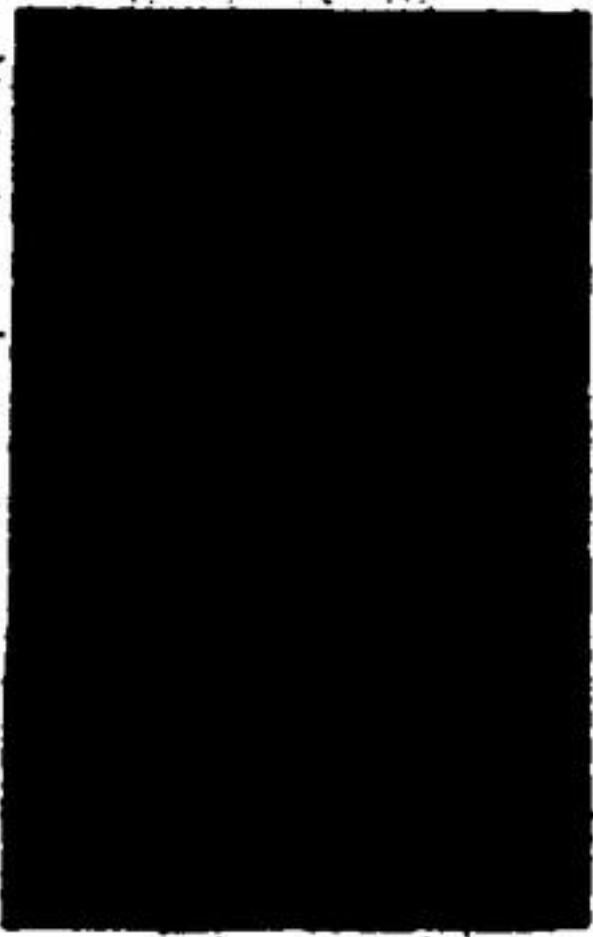

Raiders owned a two goal bulge at the end of the first period, but it was a tall dead-end after two frames.

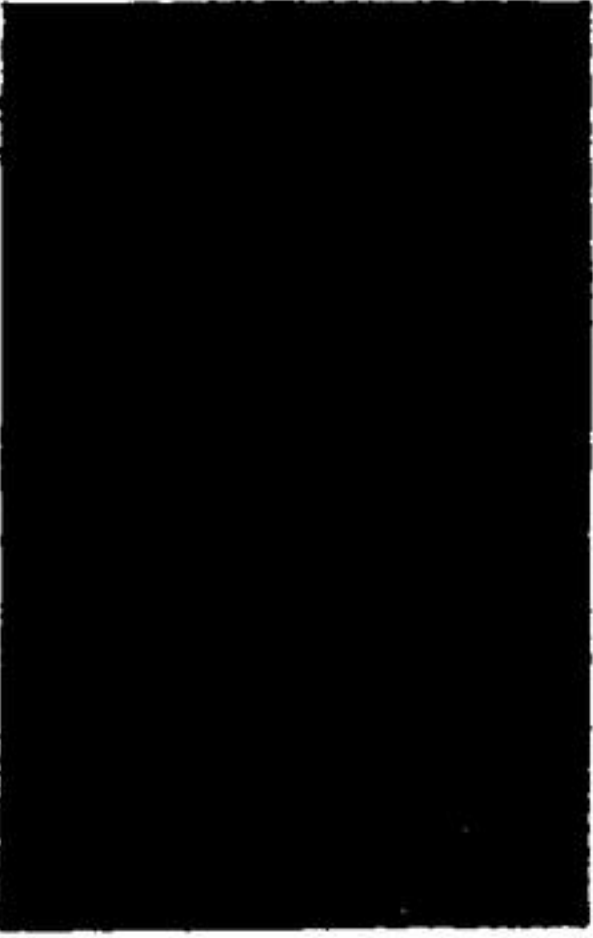
