Leaver Holstein Herd Has Top County Record

The highest scoring Holstein herds on Record of Performance have been announced for the year ending Feb. 20th. 1965. The winner for herds with 20 or more records completed, George and L. H. Leaver, Campbeliville. Their twenty three records averaged 15,501 lbs. o milk; 500 that of butterfat, 3.81 per cent. This is a breed class average of 143 for milk and 147 for fat. Thus these cows have Pickles averaged over 40 per cent higher than the average for all flolsteins of that age.


