The latest competition of the day was in the 4-H Dairy section, with 76 teams. The Halton 4-H Jersey - Guernsey - Ayrshire Calf Club was represented by Nancy Beatty and Lorrie Kile and placed 16th with 878 points.

At the conclusion of the competition, a banquet was provided by the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture. Guest speaker was K. E. Lantz, assistant deputy minister. Vera Thompson represented all contestants at the head table, and expressed appreciation to everyone responsible for the competition.
