

**LIGHTS NOT REQUIRED - SAYS DHO  
PEDESTRIANS THINK OTHERWISE**

THE TRAFFIC LIGHTS that the Ontario Department of Highways said were not necessary after a traffic survey, are being installed this week by a private firm hired by their Georgetown manufacturer, Eagle Signal Limited — and pedestrians who use the intersection frequently are resting a little easier. The lights were ordered by Georgetown council in July even though the DHO had twice turned down council's application for traffic lights there. The crossing is one of the main arteries connecting two parts of town and while vehicular traffic may be below what the DHO figures is sufficiently heavy for lights, the pedestrian traffic is abnormally high. The lights cost \$2,500.

**Nurses Choose Delegates  
For Annual Convention**

Mrs. I. Day and Mrs. A. Dutton of Burlington have been elected voting delegates from Halton Chapter of the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario to the provincial annual meeting on January 22. Alternate delegates are Mrs. A. Reeder, Milton and Miss T. Taylor, Burlington.

The election was held at the October 27 business meeting at the Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, Burlington.

Nominations were received for district representatives to the provincial committees on collective bargaining, both in the management group of nurses and the non-management group. A discussion took place on circuits supposedly to be circulated by C.N.A.P.N. The R.N.A.O. hopes that all registered nurses will complete these in order that facts be correct.

Mrs. I. Day clarified the division between management and non-management areas of nursing fields as decided at the provincial level.

Two feuding families living next door to each other in Georgetown were required to sign a bond to keep the peace between each other Wednesday, Oct. 27 in magistrate's court.

The order was made when one of the neighbours, a woman brought her neighbour, a man, to court.

The woman charged her neighbour with causing a disturbance by using insulting and obscene language during a backyard disagreement October 10.

The man pleaded not guilty. He replied that the woman called him obscene names and that the woman's husband called him foul names.

All three persons testified and wrote down the obscene expressions on pieces of paper that they handed to the magistrate, James Black.

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**LET'S PLAY BRIDGE**

I am always amazed at the variety of results that can occur on a given bridge hand. This is the fun of duplicate bridge — to see if your result is better than someone else.

With six full tables out at the Acton Bridge Club last week, every hand was played six different times. Board number one was played at no trump every time. Not only that but south was the declarer every time. In spite of these similarities there were 8 different results.

Here are the cards.  
Dealer South. Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding should be simple.

South	West	North	East
1 N.T.	Pass	3 N.T.	All Pass

The play should be almost as simple as the bidding. West leads his fourth best spade. This is run to South's ten. Since diamonds is obviously the suit to tackle, declarer should lead to dummy's ace of spades and lead the nine of diamonds for a finesse. It is important to lead the nine of diamonds. If the finesse is successful you want to be in dummy so that you can repeat the finesse. Since the finesse is successful, declarer can bring home the diamond suit with a loss of only one trick. Declarer should make eleven tricks altogether.

How would you account for the following results? Two pairs didn't get the game. Both stopped at 3 no trump one making nine tricks and other making only six tricks. The other four pairs all reached 3 no trump, making eight (down one) nine, ten and twelve tricks.

If you would like to be a better bridge player, plan on taking bridge lessons this fall. Ten lessons on the bidding and play at contract bridge will be given by Bill Coats of Acton. These lessons will go back to the fundamentals of bidding and play. Whether you are already playing bridge or have never played before, these lessons are for you.
