**SUNDAY** ...  
Sunday morning from 9:00 o'clock until 11, the ice belongs to the Northern Electric Hockey Club. The Junior C Raiders have it from 2:30 until 5:30, and a Smith and Stone Industrial Hockey League holds sway from 6 until 9 p.m. But the day's activity doesn't end there. A men's hockey league which calls itself the International League because it plays by Olympic rules moves in at 9 and stays until 11 p.m.

**MONDAY** ...  
The Georgetown Figure Skating Club has the Memorial Arena ice for seven hours on Monday, from 3 until 10 p.m. and are the only Monday ice time purchasers.

**TUESDAY** ...  
From 5:00 o'clock until 6:30 Legion-sponsored senior hockey for grads of the Little NHL occupies the rink. Tuesday it is Novice, Pee Wee and Bantam all-star hockey from 7 until 10 p.m. and a Brampton industrial, Williams Shoes Co. checks in from 10 to 11 p.m.

Wednesday's schedule starts at 1:30 with a special skating time for housewives which goes until 3:30. From 4:30 until 5:30 is Bantams practice time, and from 6:30 to 7:30 the Junior Raiders hold practice. Public skating draws a crowd from 8 until 10 and after that's wound up the Yellow Jackets Motorcycle Club take over for hockey from 10:30 until 11:30.

Georgetown Pee Wees have first ice on Thursday's with a

practice from 4:30 until 5:30. The Novices follow them with an hour's workout and at 7:00 and Juvenile all star hockey becomes the attraction. They have the ice until 10, and then hand it over to Novice Junior Farmers who cap the day with more hockey.

The youngest hockey players in town, members of the Tyke League, kick off Friday's schedule with two hours of puck churning, from 5 until 7 p.m. Seven to eight o'clock is a practice hour for Northern Electric, and 8:30 until 10 belongs to the Cheltenham hockey club. Smith
